



MANAGEMENT'S REPORT TO STOCKHOLDERS -

CASTINGS



Sales: A net sales total of \$47,693,593.43 for 1951 is the highest since the war, and represents an increase of 19.7% or \$7,853,916.39 over 1950.

Earnings: Earnings before federal taxes amounted to \$4,386,077.83, an increase of 33% over 1950. However, increased federal taxes, including excess profits tax of \$750,000.00, totaled \$2,950,000.00, an increase of \$1,432,813.27 or 94% over that of 1950. The increased tax burden reduced the net earnings to \$1,436,077.83, equal to \$4.07 per share, as compared to \$5.05 per share in 1950. Under our present tax laws, our total federal tax in 1952 could be 70%.

Operations: All major operating facilities contributed to a profitable operation. The rehabilitation program initiated in 1949 made further progress. In May, 1951, a new plant at Greensburg, Indiana, was purchased to augment our present crowded facilities in the bearing division. Installation of equipment in this unit is being pushed, and production should start early this year. A contract is being negotiated with the United States Air Force under which we will again operate a large extrusion and forging plant at Adrian, Michigan, known as Plancor 324. This plant, built by us for the government during World War II, will contain, in addition to the extrusion

facilities, one of the largest (15,000 tons) forging presses in the world, and several smaller ones. Under a temporary agreement, the plant is presently being rehabilitated at government expense, and we are assembling an operating staff. Production is planned to start soon.

Products: Estimated production of passenger cars will probably reduce output of bearings for that field, but bearings for aircraft, tanks, trucks and other defense needs may offset this loss, and the new facilities should result in a more satisfactory over-all operation. Operations in automotive replacement parts have been placed under the management of this division.

Production of sand castings for the rearmament program, particularly for jet engines and tanks, continues.

Nelson Bohnalite Autothermic Pistons presently used in the Chrysler 8, Ford, Lincoln, Mercury, Nash, Oldsmobile and Packard continue to meet the severe requirements of the modern high compression engine, and other engine builders are giving it active consideration. Other types of pistons for truck and tank engines should continue in fair volume. Permanent mold castings are also needed for other defense products.

Demand for aluminum and brass extrusions and forgings should expand as the rearmament program accelerates. With



the additional facilities at Plancor 324, our sales potential in this field should be enhanced.

Our facilities for production of brass and bronze ingot will continue to be an important factor, as the defense program will use large tonnages of these alloys.

Public Relations: Communist propaganda presents a serious threat to all of us. To aid in alerting America to its danger, a program of institutional advertising was launched in April, 1951, in national magazines and by sponsorship of a television program, "American Forum of the Air." Details are shown on the covers of this report.

On February 21, 1952, the American Legion, Department of Michigan, honored our corporation by awarding us a "Citation of Merit" for outstanding service in combating communism through advertising in national magazines and on television.

On Washington's Birthday it was announced that our corporation had been awarded an Honor Medal by the Freedoms Foundation of Valley Forge, Pennsylvania, for the contribution which our advertising made toward a better understanding of freedom in 1951.

Stockholder Census: A recent census of stockholders indicated a high degree of public ownership. Of 4,540 names appearing on the list, 3,359 own less than 100 shares each, 1,147 own less than 1,000 shares, and only 34 own more than 1,000 shares. Of this latter group, many, no doubt, are brokers or security dealers representing an undetermined number of individual holdings. Geographically, all 48 states are represented, plus Canada and several foreign countries. Men number 1,984, women 1,713, joint accounts 456, and the balance are brokers, fiduciaries, foundations and nominees.

Conclusion: Under present conditions it is impractical, if not impossible, to make any definite predictions for 1952. We intend to continue our efforts to cooperate in the defense program and to serve our customers to the best of our ability. By so doing, we believe we can best benefit our stockholders and employees.


