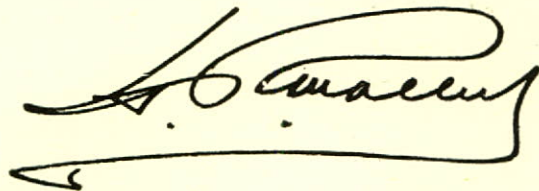

ANNUAL REPORT

Part I - General

The 1951-52 fiscal year marked a further step in the transition of the activities of the Corporation to a peacetime basis.

The number of reports of surplus received showed an increase of 9.67% over the previous year and this trend has now been maintained in every year since 1948; however, obsolescence appears to be an increasing factor in developing surpluses in government departments which indicates care is being exercised in selecting assets surplus to requirements. The recovery values are diminished accordingly.

The impact of the heavy defence production programme of the country has not been felt by the Corporation as yet except perhaps as to scrap developing from manufacturing processes on current contracts. With the greatly increased size of the armed forces, however, it is expected the Corporation will be called upon to dispose of larger quantities of surplus materials in future years.

Sales for the year ended March 31, 1952 amounted to \$3,864,777.40. Items of general merchandise, together with scrap of all kinds, formed the major part of the disposals but returns from lands and buildings sold were also a substantial contributing factor. Income from interest charges and rentals measured up to the previous year and returns under these headings now form an important part of the proceeds realized.

Market conditions remained strong throughout the year with a tendency to rise until October 1951 when prices levelled off,

the market then remaining fairly steady with the exception of prices for wool and brass which declined.

On November 1, 1951, the Head Office of the Corporation in Ottawa was moved from No. 4 Temporary Building to the new Metcalfe Building at 88 Metcalfe Street.

Offices for sales representatives are still being operated at Halifax, Ottawa, Toronto, Calgary and Vancouver as in previous years. On April 1, 1951 an office, which had previously been maintained by Park Steamship Company Limited at Montreal, largely for the supervision of marine insurance on vessels mortgaged to the Crown, was taken over by the Corporation which now assumes full responsibility for the administration of this activity with Park Steamship Company Limited still acting in the capacity of technical advisers in this regard.

United States Government Surplus

During the year under review, the Corporation entered into an agreement with the United States Government to act as its agent in disposing of surplus assets of the United States Armed Forces in Canada. Accumulations of such assets in Newfoundland and Northwestern Canada have been disposed of under this arrangement although a good portion of efforts in this respect will not be reflected until the next fiscal year. Other surpluses will be the subject of disposal action as they currently develop in United States Bases in this country.

Operations

For the fifth successive fiscal year, the allowance to the Corporation was fixed in 1951-52 by the Governor-in-Council at 10% of the net proceeds of sales. This rate was also applied to disposals made for the account of Crown Corporations of the Canadian Government and to disposals for the account of the United States Government.

With the volume of business being substantially reduced, this 10% rate proved inadequate by a small margin although proper care was exercised to keep expenses as low as possible.

Operating expenses amounted to .21% of gross sales for the year, whilst administrative expenses amounted to 10.01% of the same heading. Reference to the summary of operations of the year, under Part III of this report, will show that 89.81 cents on every dollar of gross sales made during the

year accrued to the benefit of the Canadian taxpayer.

Sales of \$5,000.00 and over for the year are detailed in the annex to this report.

Accounts Receivable

At March 31, 1952 the accounts receivable of the Corporation amounted to \$22,090,076.77, of which \$21,916,139.54 represented balances due on long-term agreements mostly secured by mortgages held. This included mortgages amounting to \$12,901,050.27 on eighty-one cargo vessels formerly part of the "Park" fleet. In regard to these, it is gratifying to report that arrears of previous years have been liquidated and that practically all debtors under this heading are now up to date on their commitments.

Staff

At March 31, 1952 the staff of the Corporation numbered 85 persons.

Part II - Statistics

The operations of the Corporation since its inception in 1944 to March 31, 1952 have resulted in a total net credit to the Federal Treasury of \$410,132,884.77 analyzed as follows:—

Part III - Financial Statements

The Balance Sheet of the Corporation as at March 31, 1952, duly certified by the Auditor General of Canada, with the Statement of Income and Expenses (Schedule I) and the Statement of Account with the Government of Canada in respect of Trust Assets for the year ended March 31, 1952 (Schedule II) are shown on pages 12 to 15 of this report.

BALANCE SHEET

During the fiscal year 1951-52, the Corporation contributed at the request of the Minister of Finance, a sum of \$1,726,648.25 from its accumulated surplus to the Consolidated Revenue Fund which, added to a voluntary contribution of \$5,037,021.45 reported in the previous fiscal year, results in a total of \$6,763,669.70 having now been turned over to the Federal Treasury out of the earnings of the Corporation in past years.

By direction of the Minister of Finance and the Treasury Board, the Corporation may retain a surplus of one million dollars in addition to sufficient cash to cover its trust account liabilities for customers' advance payments and deposits, accounts payable and accrued charges.

INCOME AND EXPENSE

The income of the Corporation derived from a percentage of the net sales amounted to \$385,653.70. The gross sales during the year amounted to \$3,864,777.40, and direct charges were \$8,240.40, leaving a net of \$3,856,537.00, of which the Corporation retained 10% or \$385,653.70, as noted above. The following summary is an analysis of the sales for the year and the income derived therefrom by the Corporation:

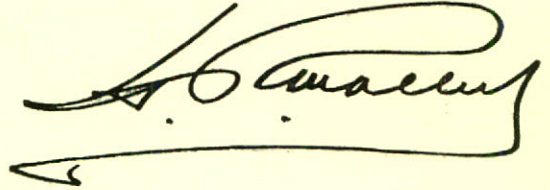
Part IV - Directors and Officers
