TO THE SHAREHOLDERS:

Your Directors present herewith the 32nd Annual Report of your Company, together with a statement of Assets and Liabilities, Profit and Loss, and Surplus Account for the year ending March 31st, 1961, duly certified by the Auditors.

Income from dividends and interest for the year less general expenses, salaries, taxes and directors' fees was \$211,244. This compares with \$223,379. for the previous year. Only dividends and interest actually earned have been considered as investment income. Capital profits on Securities sold were \$26,190. These profits as in previous years were transferred to Investment Reserve which now stands at \$512,901.

Regular dividends totalling \$3.00 were paid or declared on the 6 per cent, \$50.00 par preferred stock and dividends of \$2.40 were paid or declared on the common. Payment of these dividends required \$228,210. The excess over net investment income earnings \$16,966. was deducted from earned surplus which now stands at \$301,471.

Canadian companies which sell and export their production abroad on the basis of U.S. dollars have labour and other production costs primarily in Canadian dollars and thus in recent years have suffered substantial exchange losses which resulted in reduced profits. In some cases this has necessitated lower dividend payments to shareholders and in a moderate way to your Company. In recent months the discount on the U.S. dollar has fallen close to 1% as against an average discount of close to 4% during 1960. On the other hand increased costs and taxes make it difficult for many Canadian companies to operate on a profitable basis.

Individual shareholders residing in Canada were advised when computing their income tax for the year 1960 that they are entitled to:

> A depletion allowance equal to 10% of all preferred and common dividends received by them from this Company during the year,

(2) A tax credit of 20% of the net amount of such dividends.

On the basis of prices at the close of business March 31st, 1961, the market value of your Company's holdings showed an appreciation of \$2,124,197. over book value. After deducting the \$50.00 preferred shares at par the liquidating value of the common was \$49.65 as against \$45.22 at the end of the previous year.

All of the Company's security holdings are listed and traded on the regular stock exchanges.

During the year 920 shares of the preferred stock were redeemed at an average cost of \$50.78 per share.

You will observe from the figures shown below that net earnings from dividends and interest for the 32 years were \$4,499,645. Dividends paid on the preferred and common shares aggregated \$4,198,174.

Operations over the fiscal years 1929—1961 will be of interest to our Shareholders.
