F R E E L I S T

Among the more important articles on the Free List are the following:—

1. ANIMALS, AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTS, FISH AND PROVISIONS

Horses, cattle, sheep, etc., also domestic fowls, pigeons and pheasants for the improvement of stock; bees; tea and green coffee (imported from country of growth, or purchased in the U. K.); salt; Indian corn, not for distillation; rice, uncleaned; linseed oil cake; certain seeds, as annatto, beet, carrot, and aromatic seeds, not edible and in crude state; seed peas and seed beans, from the U. K.; certain plants for florist stock, also seedling stock; certain fruits, as bananas, pineapples, oranges and lemons; oyster seed and breeding for Canadian waters; live fish and fish eggs.

2. SUGAR, MOLASSES, AND MANUFACTURES THEREOF

Molasses, of not more than 56° by polariscope test.

3. TOBACCO, AND MANUFACTURES THEREOF

Tobacco, unmanufactured.

4. SPIRITS, WINES, AND OTHER BEVERAGES

Lime juice, crude only; mineral waters, natural, not bottled; ice; ethyl alcohol for industrial use.

5. PULP, PAPER AND BOOKS

Books, scientific and religious, or for the blind; educational text books; any Government publications; newspapers and magazines, unbound; hemp paper for manufacture of shot, shells, and felt board for gun wads; plain basic photographic paper; matrix paper for use in printing (not being tissue paper).

6. CHEMICALS, DRUGS, OILS AND PAINTS

Non-edible seeds, beans, plants, barks, and woods in a crude state, and preparations thereof; chemical compounds for dyeing and tanning; indigo, aniline and coal tar dyes; certain drugs as roots, herbs, balsams, etc., in a crude state; medicinal roots; vaccine and vaccine points; serum; various acids, salts and sulphates; cream of tartar, chloride of lime, nitrate of soda, phosphorus, etc.; potash and saltpetre; caustic soda; whale oil soap; lamp black, etc.; ultramarine blue and whitening; various gums; turpentine, raw or crude, also spirits of turpentine; gasoline under 725 specific gravity; various oils for use in manufacture.

7. EARTHS, EARTHENWARE AND STONWARE

Gypsum, crude; sundry flint, and stones, rough; gravels, clays and sands; glass cut to size for photographic purposes; firebrick (not made in Canada); carbons over 6 ins. in circumference.



8. METALS, AND MANUFACTURES THEREOF

Ores of metals of all kinds; cobalt, quicksilver, radium; manganese, oxide of; tea lead; tin and zinc, in pigs, bars, plates, etc.; brass and copper, aluminum, gold and silver, all unmanufactured; platinum wire, and in bars, strips, etc.; chronometers and compasses for ships; copper rollers for calico printing; kilns and furnaces for ore smelting (not made in Canada); anchors for vessels; news-paper printing presses; car wheel tires of steel, in the rough; cream separators; certain mining machinery, also blast furnaces, retorts, etc.; surgical and dental instruments of metal; well drilling apparatus, (not made in Canada); brass cups, in rough, for cartridges; iron or steel masts, plates, cable chains, etc., for vessels; church bells, boiler plates; steel wire for manufacture of rope, or for ship's rigging; nickle, nickle silver and German silver; steel, or galvanized iron, wire.

9. WOOD, AND MANUFACTURES THEREOF

Corkwood, unmanufactured; cane and rattans, not manufactured; saw dust of wood; shingles, logs and round timber, unmanufactured; firewood, fence posts and railway ties; Mexican saddle trees; barrel staves of oak, wheel spokes, planks and boards, in the rough.

10. COTTON, FLAX, HEMP, JUTE AND OTHER FIBRES, AND SILK, WOOL, AND MANUFACTURES THEREOF

Cloth for bookbinders; coir yarn; fibre Mexican, natural; hemp, oakum; jute or hemp yarn; linen yarn; binder twine; camel's hair; alpaca; certain jutes and wools; silk, raw or as reeled from the cocoon.

11. MISCELLANEOUS

Asphalt; tar and pitch; anthracite coal and coke; hides and furs not dressed in any manner; rubber, unmanufactured; quills, natural; whalebone, unmanufactured; buckrum for hat shapes; hatter's furs, not on the skin; broom corn and bristles; fertilizers, unmanufactured; glycerine, for explosives; emery in bulk; meerschaum, crude or raw; mother-of-pearl and other shells, unmanufactured; old junk; certain fish hooks and deep-sea fishing nets; artificial limbs; life saving apparatus; collections of coins, medals and stamps; prize trophies, bona fide; scientific instruments, charts, etc.; antiquities for libraries, etc.; models of inventions; botanical, mineralogical and taxidermic specimens; unset diamonds; settlers' effects; casual presents from friends abroad on which the duty, otherwise payable, does not exceed fifty cents.

S U R T A X T A R I F F 1 9 0 3

The German Government having applied to Canadian goods the least favorable Customs Tariff in consequence of not being treated with the same consideration as Canada treats the United Kingdom, the Canadian Government applied a Surtax, under which German goods are subject to additional duties of one-third of the regular duties imposed by the General Tariff Act, consequently the duties on goods imported from Germany are $33\frac{1}{3}$ per cent. greater than on goods from other countries. This Surtax came into operation on German goods purchased after April 16th, 1903.

D U M P I N G C L A U S E 1 9 0 4

The special duty on undervalued goods provides that in cases where the export price, *i. e.*, the actual selling price to the Canadian importer, of any imported dutiable article, of a class or kind produced in Canada, is less than the market value thereof, a special additional duty shall be imposed equal to the difference between the market value and the selling price, provided, however, that the special duty shall not exceed one-half of the ordinary duty.

Exception is made in regard to certain iron and steel products on which the special duty shall not exceed 15 per cent. *ad valorem*, nor more than the difference between the selling price and the market value.
