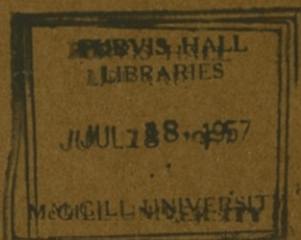

Sir:—

On behalf of the Board of Directors, I have the honour to transmit report of operations and affairs of the Canadian National Railway System for the calendar year 1932. The accounts have been examined by Chartered Accountants representing, and appointed by, the Dominion Government, and their certificate is endorsed on the balance sheet.

The report this year presents an income statement covering the all-inclusive Canadian National System. This will avoid any possibility of confusion arising through the presentation of two separate income statements, one for Eastern Lines, and the other for the balance of the System, and complies with the request of members of the Select Standing Committee of the House of Commons on Railways and Shipping, and also of the Royal Commission on Transportation. However, in accordance with the requirements of the Maritime Freight Rates Act, the deficit on Eastern Lines is shown as a separate item.

Close budgetary control of capital expenditures and operating expenses, additional scrutiny of expenditures by the Finance Committee of the Directors, and reduction in working capital have made it possible to keep the total cash requirements of the System within the budgeted estimate as presented to Parliament. This result has been achieved despite the fact that the revenues of the System declined \$39,401,567 as compared with the previous year. It was made possible by the loyalty and continuing efforts of all concerned to secure the maximum of economy. The item "Other Income Accounts—Net Debit" which shows an increase of \$4,031,382 was largely influenced by discount on Canadian funds in the United States, and by a decrease in dividend income from affiliated companies.

The year 1932 witnessed a continuance of the world's great economic depression. The revenues of the railways, in common with those of other enterprises throughout the world, suffered such severe declines that the most strenuous efforts were required to cope with the situation. The necessity for drastic curtailment of expenditure was fully appreciated by the Canadian National System management, and strict economy was practised in all departments. The ratio of operating expenses to operating revenues was 96.34 in 1932 as compared with 99.41 in 1931.

Since 1928, when an all-time peak in railway revenues in this country was touched, the trend of railway earnings has been steadily downward. In 1929 Canadian National Railways' gross revenues on the all-inclusive System showed a decline of \$13,053,649 from 1928; in 1930 the decline from the previous year amounted to \$48,264,281; 1931 saw a decline of \$50,462,939 from 1930, and in 1932 the decline was \$39,401,568, as compared with 1931. The total receipts in 1932 were \$161,103,594 as compared with \$312,286,031 in 1928, a decrease of \$151,182,437 or 48 per cent. For every dollar which the Canadian National received in 1928, it received only 52 cents in 1932. To meet the situation, economies have been effected through the elimination of unprofitable services, the reduction and re-organization of the supervisory staff, closing of stations and office buildings, laying off a large number of employees, including many previously carried on part-time, and by such other measures as could be made effective without bearing too heavily upon the communities served. At the present time the staff is approximately 31 per cent below the 1929 level. The total payroll,

on the other hand, is 39 per cent below the 1929 figure. The average number of employees and amount of compensation they received, from 1929 to 1932 inclusive, is as follows:—

In addition to staff reductions, all employees of the System were subjected in 1932 to decreases in rates of pay. The economy effected by these decreases in rates of pay reduced the payroll account by more than \$10,000,000 per year. The supervisory payroll of the Canadian National System was considerably reduced during 1932 through the consolidation of operating districts and divisions; by the abolition of a number of positions, and by a general readjustment of salaries, so that the cost of supervision of the Canadian National System is currently at a level approximately 35 per cent below that of 1929.

The elimination of a great many unprofitable passenger services has been brought about by a severe curtailment of passenger train miles. The reductions in passenger train miles and passenger car miles from 1929 were as follows:—

Some idea of the extent of these reductions may be gained by realizing that they are equivalent to wiping out practically one-third of the passenger train service operated in 1929.

When the general upturn in business comes, the Canadian National System will show, in increased net earnings and income, its power of recovery.

A statement of the receipts and expenditures of the System for the ten year period, 1923 to 1932 inclusive, will be found on page 18.

REVENUES

Total operating revenues in 1932 showed a reduction of \$39,401,568, as compared with the previous year, a decrease of 19.1%, which is closely in conformity with the results on the more important railways of the North American continent.

The decline in freight revenues amounted to \$28,236,631 (18.96%) made up as follows:—

Passenger revenues were \$17,258,919, a decrease of \$5,940,817 (25.61%) as compared with the year 1931.

The decrease in passenger traffic was largely an effect of the depression and closely followed the general trend of business. Normal everyday movements dropped off due to lessened business activities. Tourist traffic decreased considerably as shortage of funds, in some cases, and uncertainty of outlook in others kept people at home. Early in the year, jointly with the Canadian Pacific, a plan was adopted by which excursions were operated alternately by the two railways, chiefly between Canadian points.

Express revenue was \$9,051,420, a decrease of \$1,975,827 (17.92%) as compared with the year 1931. The greater part of the decrease was in the movement of first and second class express traffic, caused by existing depressed business conditions and increased motor truck competition. Revenues from fish traffic declined to a considerable extent. Fruit traffic, on the whole, showed a slight improvement.

Telegraph revenue was \$3,676,339, a decrease of \$1,022,427 (21.76%) compared with the year 1931. The decrease was ascribable to decreased business activity.

OPERATING EXPENSES

Examination of the operating expenses shows the results of successive measures of economy. In 1929 operating expenses were reduced by \$751,401 as compared with 1928, and in 1930, by which time it was evident that the depression was not to be shortlived, operating expenses were reduced by \$26,692,739 from those of the previous year; in 1931 there was a reduction of \$29,489,433 from 1930 and in 1932 a further reduction of \$44,104,834 from the 1931 figures, the operating expenses of 1932 being \$101,000,000 under 1928.

The reduction of \$44,104,834, or 22%, in railway operating expenses in 1932, as compared with 1931, was divided as between:—

Despite the drastic economies put into effect, the operating efficiency of the Canadian National System was maintained. In general, the indices of operating efficiency, by which the larger railway systems gauge their performance, show few declines and generally show improvement. CAPITAL EXPENDITURES

Capital expenditures were severely curtailed and were limited to those which could not be avoided. Net capital expenditures during the last four years were:—1929—\$88,499,908; 1930—\$66,560,354; 1931—\$34,287,067 and for 1932—\$799,158.

New rolling stock purchased or built during the year amounted to \$128,434, the units acquired being 1 locomotive and 3 units of work equipment. Of these, 1 locomotive and 2 cars were constructed in shops of the National System.

Retirements of equipment during the year consisted of 61 locomotives, 2,729 freight cars, 78 passenger cars and 359 work equipment units. The original cost of this retired equipment was \$4,218,937, of which amount \$3,473,898 was charged to the year's operating expenses and salvage value charged to material account.

The practice of charging to Operating Expenses the cost of treating ties with preservatives was discontinued on Canadian Lines and the cost of such treatment from January 1, 1932, is charged to capital account.

PURCHASES AND STORES

Material and supplies inventories were reduced during the year by \$5,396,670. The prices of commodities purchased by the Railway were somewhat lower than in the previous year.

LAND SALES

During the year, 8,120 acres of Canadian National Railways' lands were sold for \$68,645, an average of \$8.45 per acre, as compared with 8,349 acres sold at an average price of \$11.66 in 1931.

HOTEL OPERATIONS

Hotel operations showed a profit before taxes of \$70,392 in 1932, as compared with a loss of \$76,660 in 1931. This result was achieved despite a decline of \$590,700 in gross revenue.

NORTHERN ALBERTA RAILWAYS

The Canadian National Railways are joint owners with the Canadian Pacific of the Northern Alberta Railways Company. The operations of this property during 1932 resulted in a net loss of \$1,033,267, as compared with a loss of \$1,142,354 in 1931, of which amount the Canadian National's proportion amounted to \$516,633, as against \$571,177 in 1931.

Under agreement of purchase dated February 6, 1929, the Canadian National Railway Company became liable for one half the purchase consideration for these railways, the total purchase consideration being as follows:

and in addition the assumption of principal and interest of securities of the Edmonton, Dunvegan and British Columbia Railway Company, viz., First Mortgage 4% Debenture Stock due 16th February, 1942, \$7,000,000 and First Mortgage 4½% Gold Bonds due October 22nd, 1944, \$2,420,000, a total of \$9,420,000, or a total for cash payment and securities of \$25,000,000.

As the assets and liabilities of the Northern Alberta Railways Company are not included in the consolidated balance sheet of the Canadian National System, it is considered advisable to state that the future commitment of the Canadian National in this respect is \$10,000,000.

UNEMPLOYMENT RELIEF

During the year all projects undertaken as unemployment relief in accordance with the provisions of the Unemployment Relief Act 21 Geo. V Chapter 1, were completed. Under the provisions of the Unemployment and Farm Relief Act 21-22 Geo. V, Chapter 58, the Company received in 1932, 1,918,091 ties which had been purchased by the Government.

FINANCE

No public financing was done by the Canadian National Railways during the year 1932.

During the year retirement of funded debt amounted to \$11,940,039.

PENSION AND SUPERANNUATION

Under the provisions of the Canadian National Railways' Pension Act (non-contributory), there were retired during the year 734 employees. The number deceased in 1932, who were in receipt of pension, totalled 226. Total number receiving pension under this Act was 3,001 at the end of 1932.

Under the provisions of the Grand Trunk Railway of Canada Superannuation and Provident Fund Association, a contributory fund which was closed to new members in 1908, 38 members of the staff were retired during the year 1932. The number of members deceased during the year was 6. The number in receipt of superannuation under this Fund was 144 at the close of the year.

Under the Intercolonial and Prince Edward Island Railways Employees' Provident Fund Act (a contributory plan, closed to new members in 1929), there were retired during the year 223 members of the staff. The number deceased during the year who were receiving superannuation under this Act totalled 87. The number in receipt of superannuation from this fund totalled 1,536 at December 31st, 1932.

SALARY AND WAGE NEGOTIATIONS

The 10% deduction applied by agreement to the running trades and railway telegraphers in December 1931 was continued throughout 1932. During the year negotiations were carried on with various labour organizations leading to agreements for a reduction of 10% in the basic rate of wages on Canadian Lines. On May 1, 1932 the reduced time plan of half day per week applicable to clerical forces, maintenance of way employees and other miscellaneous employees was cancelled, and the rates of pay of these employees made subject to a reduction of 10%.

On the United States Lines of the Canadian National, the Chicago agreement was put into effect on February 1, 1932. This agreement called for a reduction of 10% in the wages of all railway employees.

During the year 1931, official salaries were reduced by 10%, and in 1932 a survey was made of all salaried positions paying \$2,700 or more per year. A reduced salary scale was put into force, the percentage reduction being heavier in the higher paid positions. In addition, the reduced salaries were further made subject to a 5% deduction.
