Dear Dr. Archibald,

I am sending this letter by way of Montreal in case you should have started for home before this reaches California. I have delayed in answering your good letter until things should crystalize a little further. I hope that you have been thoroughly enjoying yourself and getting the kind of rest you wanted most.

Dr. Come has not decided yet what course he will pursue. I have not altered your original offer to him for the present, it seems to me better to leave things as they are. We will probably go up to Montreal the end of this week and I have every hope that he will decide to come then. I am glad that you agreed to the scheme of looking about at other clinics in the month of March and it was very decent of you to suggest that the salary guaranteed, be started in that month.

I have made formal application to the Rockefeller Foundation for a Travelling Fellowship and shall not know what the result is for another week, at any rate. The more I think of it, the more important it seems to me that I take a trip to Germany just now. I would go the end of March and come back the first of October and we could start things in real earnest on the first. I could arrange to reach Montreal on the 20th of September and in that way have time to do the last things about equipment and about getting settled in Montreal. Between now and sailing time I could go over the equipment as it is up there at both hospitals perhaps and outline any possible additions of either instruments or tables and the same could be done with regard to the laboratory. That would make it possible to get a house man who would be ready to start October first. That would allow time also, to get a substitute if necessary for Dr. Cone. He is likewise set on going abroad not but could be on the job October first.

Dr. Meakins has written me a very nice letter and made drawings of the three rooms which are available in his laboratory. I thought when I go up there this week I would look over the laboratory and equipment very carefully. I will follow your advice about the Montreal General Hospital and will talk to Dr. MacKay and try to meet the people interested at that hospital. I shall propose no arrangement at all but listen to their suggestions. I think, as you say, it would be possible to organize a service at both hospitals, if they want that at the General and although I should prefer to confine my activity to one hospital, I presume it would be only caught at the beginning, at any rate. In regard to equipment it seems to me also, as you suggest, very much better to modify the existing equipment wherever possible rather then getting out and out new equipment.
