My dear Penfield:

Just a short letter, in a hurry!

Everything seems to promise well. Your equipment, as submitted to Dr. Meakins, and ordered by the University, is coming in and is being stored for you. The rooms are being fixed up, but Meakins tells me that he can not put a door in one place where you wanted it; otherwise it is all as you wished.

The Board of Governors of the Hospital has subscribed, individually, the amount necessary for your general equipment; that is on to \$5,000. This was upon an appeal made by Dr. Martin. In addition I have a further offer of \$500 from Dr. Reford's mother. I think I mentioned this in a previous letter, but the offer was made definite a few days ago, and you are at liberty to buy whatever piece of equipment you want. I had thought of a complete Zeiss microscope, but of course if there is anything else you would like, such as a special microtome, you can get it and spend up to \$500. In addition, Dr. Reford desires me to say that he will lend you indefinitely his own pre-war Zeiss microscope, which, however, needs one or two objectives, and these you can get at his expense and bring with you. I will give you the details in my next letter.

I have had no applications for your internship, but that can be left until you arrive, but if you would like to write to any of your friends in the States to get a man, you may do so at any time. There is one man appointed by Meakins to the Neurological Department as a whole, who would be able to keep you going at first. He thought one man for the whole Department might be sufficient, but I think not.

I have on hand at the moment a gasserian, which I am to do tomorrow, and another case of tic, possibly for alcohol, a case of traumatic 7th nerve palsy, and a pituitary case with headache, one eye quite blind and a temporal blindness on the other side. Tomorrow I have to see a case of frontal tumour, in the public ward. I have been trying to put off cases until fall, for you. The gasserian won't wait. I think the material is going to be sufficient.

I am really pleased that you are working with Foerster

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and especially that you had a visit at Leriche's place.
