Dear Colonel Cross:

I received your letter of June 5th together with the broadside of May 31st.

We are still on the quest for a student of etymology who can publish a glossary of terms which will cover the coinage from which you are constantly drawing: You sent the letter which was written to me, evidently by mistake, to Ken MacKenzie in Toronto. He has returned it to me. I have read it over the telephone to Dr. Martin. I think it is fair to say that our conclusion is that the donors would prefer that the money sent over through us should not be used for loans to members of the staff, but should only be used for the scientific needs of the staff which cannot be covered in the ordinary way, or as a supplement to the comfort and well being of the staff.

I am enclosing a draft on London for \$500.00, however, which will make it possible to carry on, and you can make a definite statement of the whole situation as soon as the loans are called in.
