Thanks for your copy of your letter of the 23rd inst. to Mr. Philips. With reference to the third page of it, I am embarrasses to have to confess that I have got the fourth word of the motto wrong. It should be IATHENTA, as I had it at first, not IOTHENTA. It is a faulty A, as printed in our copy, and when your secretary telephoned me to verify it, I misread it O (Omega). There is no doubt that IATHENTA is right.

You are surely rash to assume that Mr. P's workmen will know how to render the Latin letters into Greek. The second word TROTHENTA, is rare and tricky, and not to be found in its place in the dictionary, being the past participle of a very different looking verb, TITROSKO, I wound. How are they to know that the O is an Omega (A)? I would suggest that you send Mr. P. the better of the two transcriptions which I enclose. It may save a mistake or at least a search on their part for the correct varieties of E and O.
