<u>P.S.</u> The picture on the front of the menu is a photograph of the painting on the ceiling of the entrance hall. The drawing of the neuroglia cells is from an original by Golgi. You will notice in the border the ventricle, and the Greek legend "Egkephalon de Trothenta Eidomen Bothenta" comes from Galen, and Francis has interpreted it as "I have seen a severely wounded brain healed." The hieroglyphics represent the word "brain", being the first appearance of that word in literature; it was taken from the Smith papyrus. The Ram, of course, symbolizes the head of the brain in astrology.
