Dear Carr,

We were so disappointed that Sir Charles cannot come over to give us his official blessing at the opening of the Montreal Neurological Institute.

I am writing to you for help, to get material for a short sketch of Sir Charles' life. We are publishing a small volume at the time of the opening of the Institute which will contain addresses made at the opening and also the lives of those fourteen men whom we consider to have contributed most to neurology. One of the men on my staff, Dr. Arthur Elvidge, is working on the life of your father. As with all of the lives, he is attempting to include both a personal sketch and a review of his scientific work. The scientific portion of it is quite easy. I wonder if you can send over any information that can be used in getting together the details of his early life, and those things in his career which cast most light on his personality.

A summary of his school and university career with the main events of his life would help, of course, and also an occasional letter or something of that sort might be of great assistance. Any information that you could let us have we will be glad to send back, of course. The sketch will not occupy more than six printed pages.

Helen and I send our best to Margaret. We hope so much that Sir Charles' rheumatism is better and that all goes well with you.
