Dear Paul and Mae,

You have gotten my telegram long since, I suppose, but I am writing to you before your answer will have time to reach me. I do hope you have not planned to go South or some other useless place. You cannot imagine what a tonic effect the snow has this year. By the middle of February there will be a great deal of sun on the snow and I guarantee an excellent sunburn. We cannot, of course, guarantee the weather altogether, but on the whole the middle of February is considered by ski-ers the best time in the year.

At present the snow is very deep. We had some good skiing down there after Christmas. We can do some sleighing about the country and perhaps make some trails. I shall take pleasure in nominating Paul as the secretary of the Ski Club. It seems to me better for you to change at New York and take the nine forty-five train out of New York, as that gets you into Montreal in plenty of time. If on the other hand you take the through train from Washington it is necessary to leave Washington earlier and you will arrive in Montreal so late that there may be some question about your catching the train.

We will all have breakfast in the station. We leave this time from the Windsor Station which is the one into which you come, leaving there at nine o'clock in the morning. We will be met in South Bolton by our farmer with a team and a very large ~~wagon~~-box on sleds which will be quite warm and capable of carrying anything you bring, but I think bags would be easier than trunks to handle. You will need your skis and plenty of very old, very warm clothing.

If the eight of us can get together in the eternal snows, I am quite sure that there will be many moral and political questions settled once and for all, to say nothing of the restoration of health and youth. You will be back on Monday night in plenty of time to have dinner and catch the train for Washington.

Helen will have help down there so that it will not be difficult for any of us. She will probably go a couple of days ahead in order to practice skiing. ~~We do hope you can come.~~
