Not knowing your address I have forwarded your letter care of william and hope that it reaches you safely.

I thought that you might be interested to know of a move that we are planning to make at McGill. I have wanted very much to express somehow the gratitude which I feel to the memory of Mrs. Ottmann. For her generosity has made it possible for me to push ahead a great deal of research which otherwise would have been seriously handicapped.

We have created a fellowship of twenty-four hundred dollars yearly, to be taken from the money which she left, and to be used by a man who is working on one of the problems which lies before us in epilepsy. The fellowship will be called "The Madeleine Ehret Ottmann Memorial Fellowship in Neurosurgery." It will appear in the University Calendar and in any publication which the Fellow may make he will sign himself "Madeleine Ehret Ottmann Research Fellow."

The first fellow will be Dr. J.N. Petersen who was about to leave us and go to Hartford where they had made him an attractive offer in their hospital. He will put in half of his time working on certain problems in the ever increasing number of patients who come to us with this terrible complaint.

I wish that I could make some more eloquent gesture in appreciation of your sister's attitude, but I thought I would like to have you know that we have done this. This year there will be four younger men who have come here to work upon some aspects of our problem, who are being helped by smaller fellowships which are simply called "Neurosurgical Research Fellowships" but which also will be drawn from the money she gave us and from the money she bequeathed us when it shall be available.
