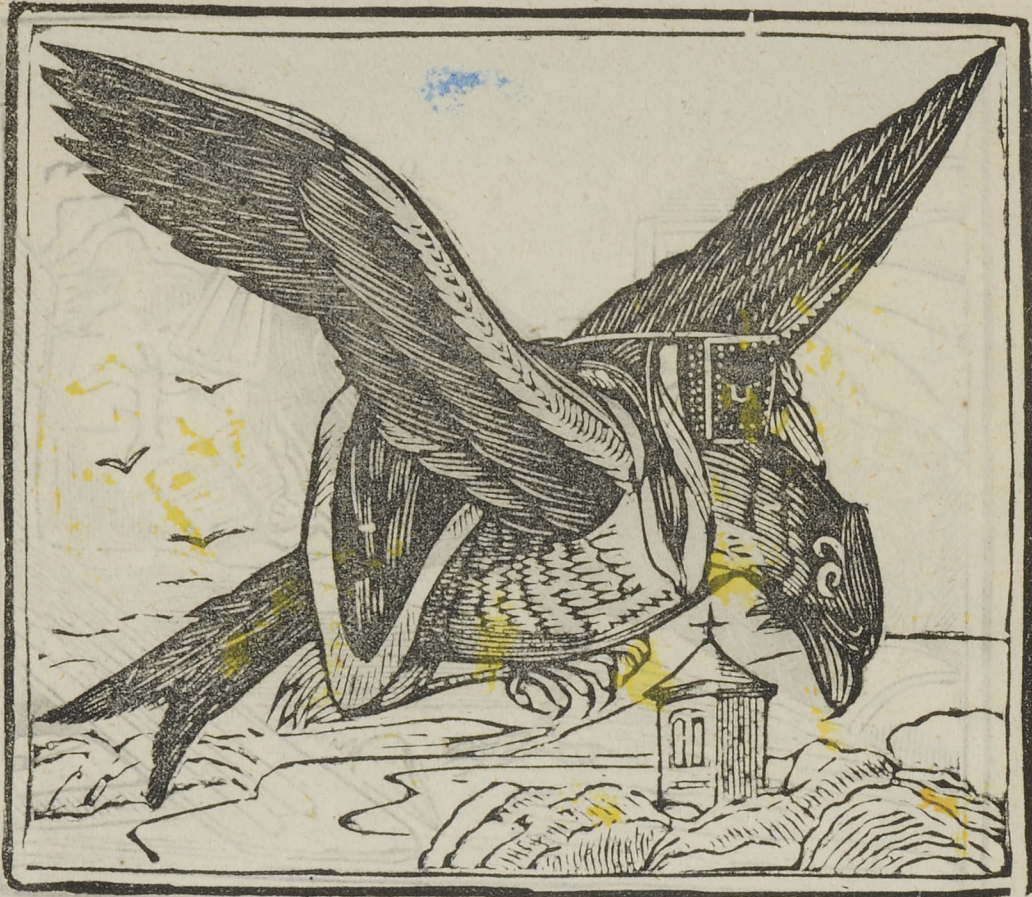


Who'll be the Parson? I, said the Rook,
