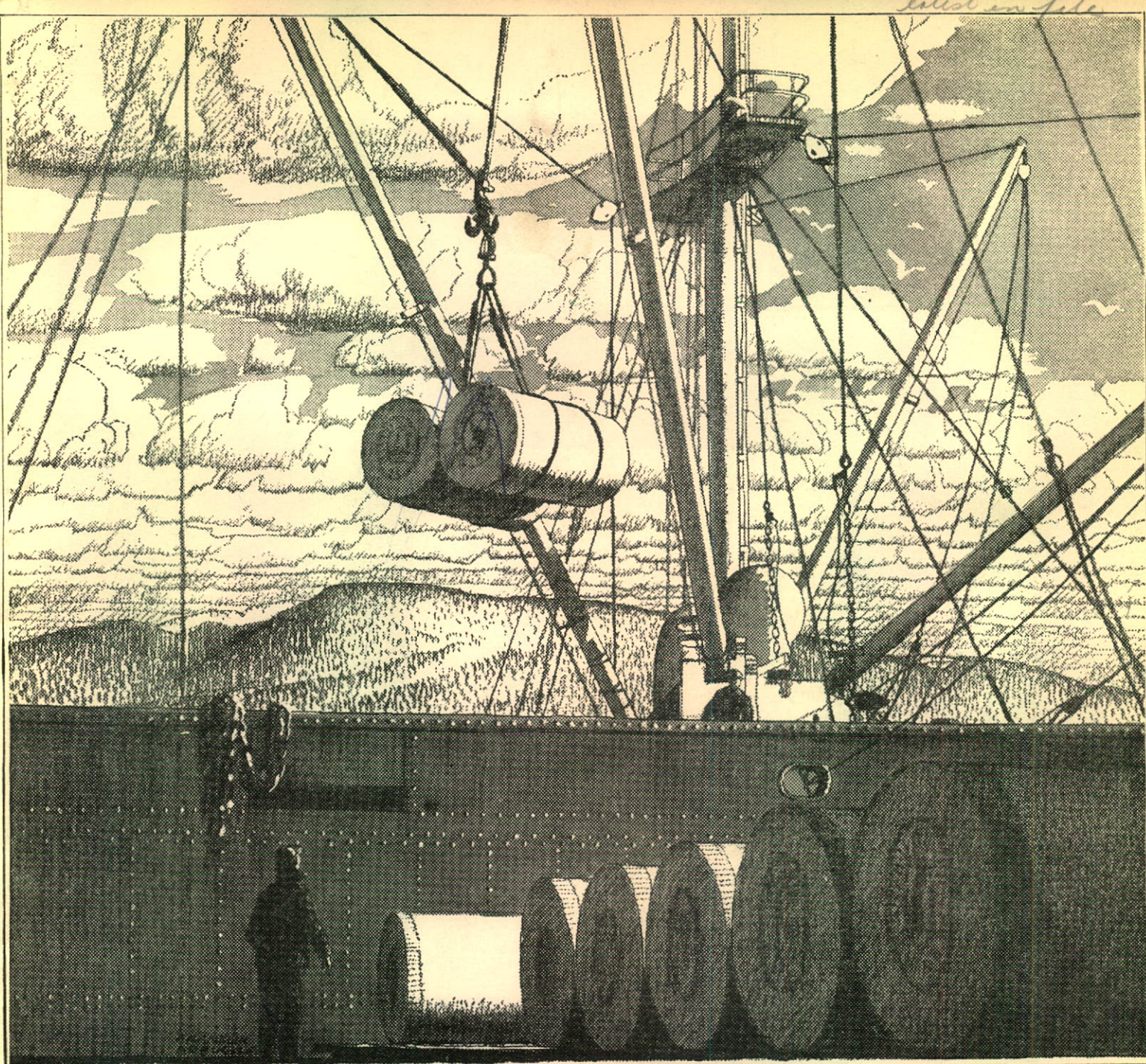

CANADIAN PULP AND PAPER ASSOCIATION

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The cover drawing, by Franklin Arbuckle, R.C.A., shows paper moving abroad. The industry alone accounts for practically a quarter of the value of the exports of Canada which stands first amongst the nations as an exporter of pulp and paper. At the same time, amidst all Canadian industry, pulp and paper also stands first in employment and wages paid, first in capital invested, and first in value of production.

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Introduction

These tables annually present a succinct picture of pulp and paper operations, their intimate relationship with the forest resources and the forest crop, and something, too, of the importance of the industry in the economy of Canada.

Every effort has been made to include herein as many 1954 figures as possible; but in many instances it has been impossible either to obtain the 1954 figures or to provide informed estimates. Particularly is this so of 1954 dollar value figures many of which will not be available from government sources until the end of 1955.

While the material herein is clearly set forth in the index, it should be noted that in Section "F" may be found, not only the figures revealing the national significance of the industry, but also general statistics covering its operations as a whole.

In most of the newsprint tables in Section "D", the Newfoundland statistics have been consolidated with those of Canada for all preceding years. Elsewhere, the figures prior to 1949 have not been consolidated as Newfoundland statistics were not compiled on the same basis as those of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. The figures covering Newfoundland's production up to 1948 will be found in Tables 37, 48 and 72.

The publication of these tables has largely been made possible through the kindly aid of L. J. Pouliot, chief of the Forestry Section of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics; and to him grateful acknowledgment is made.

Forest Increment

Pulp and Paper Figures:

The relation between consumption and growth in the forests of the pulp and paper industry may thus be summarized:

1. The industry leases a total of 182,840 square miles of woodlands from the provincial governments.
2. The annual crop from these limits, together with other losses, averages less than one eighth of a cord per acre.
3. All scientific measurements made to date indicate a growth on the limits well in excess of an eighth of a cord per acre.
4. The forests leased by the companies are usually operated under a management plan approved and supervised by the provincial government involved and the cut is not permitted to exceed the growth. For example, in Quebec all but 2 per cent of the areas leased by the pulp and paper companies are operated under these government-approved management plans.

The industry has a declared Forest Policy of perpetual yield and the companies generally have stated that their woodlands are managed to provide a crop in perpetuity.

Over-all Figures:

Complete estimates of the growth in the Canadian forests as a whole have not been compiled, but the following facts are known:

While there is but a small growth in many areas, over considerable tracts growths have been recorded by the Federal Forestry Branch of: 25—40
Managed forests in Scandinavia produce: 28
Replacement of annual depletion in the accessible productive forest areas requires an average annual growth of: 12
The foregoing figures do not indicate that there is cause for complacency regarding the future maintenance of the forests and their proper conservation for use.

Other factors affecting these figures include:

1. While the annual increment appears to exceed the annual depletion, no comprehensive and proper estimate of forest increment in Canada as a whole has yet been prepared.
2. Insects and diseases in the forests periodically reach epidemic proportions; unless checked they will affect the existing balance between depletion and increment.
3. In many instances the depletion is concentrated in the more accessible areas. Growth that accrues in more remote areas is not used.
4. Repeated fires retard and often make impossible the proper regeneration of the forests.
5. Land tenures are often such that there is no economic or other urge upon some loggers to operate along scientific methods.

Table 11.
Cords, Cubic Feet, and Board Measure

A standard cord is a stack of wood 4 x 4 x 8 feet containing 128 cubic feet of wood, bark, and interstices. A cord usually contains about 85 cubic feet of solid wood, but the content varies with the size of the logs.

In the lumber industry, wood is usually measured by the board foot. A board foot is the equivalent of a board one inch in thickness and one square foot in surface area. The relationship between board measure and cord measure varies in different sections of the Dominion. Usually, 2 cords are considered to be equivalent to about 1000 feet board measure. But this ratio also varies with the size and type of the wood.

In the past, the basis and classification upon which exports of paper other than newsprint have been compiled have been modified from time to time. Consequently, only figures covering recent years are included in this and in the succeeding table.

Moreover, because they are compiled on a somewhat different basis, the two tables which follow are not comparable to the production figures in tables 65 and 66.

Also, some of the exports go through a converting plant before shipment. Thus, many of the exports have a value enhanced by the conversion or packaging process, whereas the production figures show the valuation at the basic rate.

Again, the tonnage figures for certain paper products exported are not available. The dollar figures covering these exports will be found in the succeeding table under the heading "Paper Products".

A proportion of the pulpwood car loadings included pulpwood for export. Deducting an estimate for pulpwood shipped abroad, the pulp and paper industry's car loadings of pulpwood and finished products were equivalent to over eight trains of 100 cars daily. Annual loadings of pulpwood for the mills and of finished products would thus fill a train 2,500 miles in length. In addition, the pulp and paper industry creates a vast rail traffic of coal, chemicals, and other supplies required for the operations at the mills and in the woods.

Note: The power consumption of the pulp and paper mills accounts for over 27 per cent of all the power generated by central electric stations for industry and for mining. Of the power generated by industry for its own use, the pulp and paper mills accounted for 61.7 per cent in 1951 and 63 per cent in 1952. Of the total consumption of electricity in Canada, the pulp and paper mills accounted for 24.7 per cent in 1951 and 24.3 per cent in 1952. There are several single paper mills which alone consume more electric power than all the domestic customers in Montreal combined, indeed which use more power than is required to provide light for the city and all its residents. There are single pulp and paper mills which use half as much power as that consumed by all the industries in the Montreal area.

Notes: Since 1952, "value of factory shipments" has replaced "gross value of products" in all manufacturing industries except Pulp and Paper, Sawmills, Veneer and Plywood, Aircraft and parts, and Shipbuilding. As inventories are relatively small in the industries for which factory shipments are used, the general comparability of the figures is not seriously affected.

The gross value of products or of factory shipments given above, is limited to the annual production of commodities, and is not comparable with "gross national product" given in Table 76, which includes transportation, communication, trade, finance, and service activities. The computation is entirely different and the "gross national product" comprises, in addition, depreciation allowances, other similar business costs, and indirect taxes less subsidies.

While the statistics of gross production are of interest, indicating the amount of revenue generated by the corporations and operators in the field, the total includes a large element of duplication: often the products of one industry become the materials of other industries. The net value of production obtained by deducting the cost of materials, fuel and electricity is a more accurate measure of the contribution to the national economy.

The value of agricultural production includes forest production on farmers' wood lots. As such products are also reported under forestry, the amount of duplication is deducted.

A survey of production must differentiate between the more important branches and at the same time present a grand total that will be free from overlapping. For example, the products of pulp and paper mills and sawmills are included in forestry production as being the first finished products of commercial value resulting from the productive process. They may, however, be classified under manufactures in view of the nature of the production process. The production of such industries is regarded both as primary and secondary, but the duplication is eliminated from the grand total.
