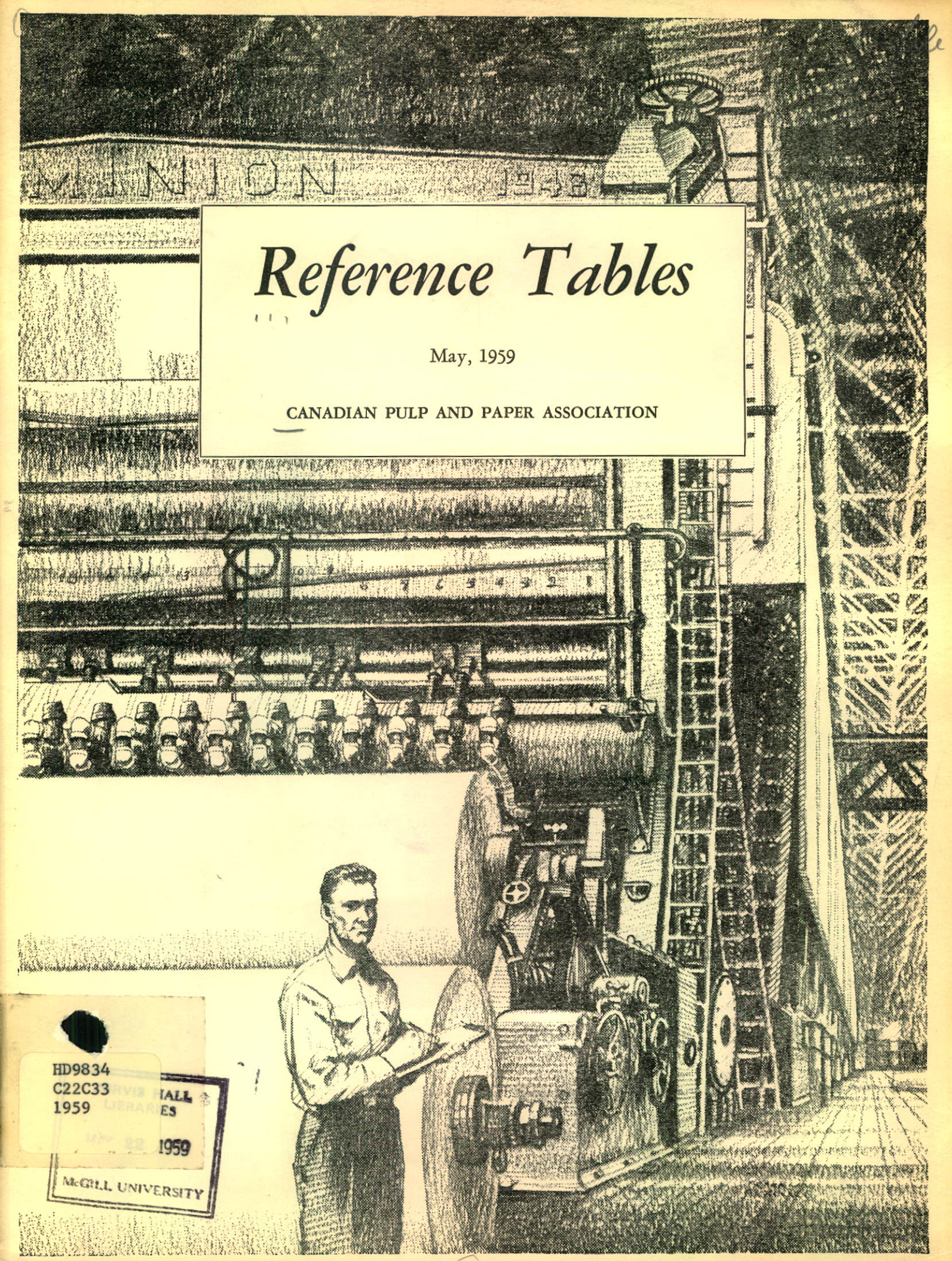

The cover drawing of a newsprint machine is by Franklin Arbuckle, R.C.A. One hundred and forty-nine of these machines, in Canadian mills from coast to coast, supply almost half the free-world's newspaper pages. As long as a football field, they may spin out a ribbon of paper, up to twenty-eight feet in width, at speeds as great as twenty-five miles per hour. The newsprint mills, the producers of pulp, and the manufacturers of hundreds of other grades of paper and paperboard constitute Canada's greatest industrial enterprise. In value of production and exports, pulp and paper leads all Canadian industry.

Introduction

These tables annually present a succinct picture of pulp and paper operations, their intimate relationship with the forest resources and the forest crop, and something, too, of the importance of the industry in the economy of Canada.

Every effort has been made to include herein as many 1958 figures as possible; but in many instances it has been impossible either to obtain the 1958 figures or to provide informed estimates. Particularly is this so of 1958 dollar value figures many of which will not be available from government sources until the end of 1959.

While the material herein is clearly set forth in the index, it should be noted that Section "B" contains a summary of the industry's operations for 1957, and relates the production and markets of that year to the pulpwood harvest. Section "F" contains figures revealing not only the national significance of the industry, but also general statistics covering its operations as a whole.

In Section "D", the Newfoundland statistics have been consolidated, unless otherwise noted, with those of Canada for all years. Elsewhere, Newfoundland figures have been consolidated with those of Canada only since 1949 as prior to that year they were not compiled on the same basis as those of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. The figures covering Newfoundland's production up to 1948 will be found in Tables 34, 45, and 70.

The publication of these tables has largely been made possible through the kindly aid of L. J. Pouliot, chief of the Forestry Section of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics; and to him grateful acknowledgment is made.

Pulp and Paper Woodlands

The pulp and paper mills lease 182,840 square miles of forest, or slightly more than 117 million acres. Over the past five years, the wood taken by the mills from this acreage has averaged 8½ million cords a year. Such a cut runs to an average of 6¼ cubic feet per acre per year to which, in order to obtain the total depletion, must be added the losses caused by fire, insects, disease, and natural mortality.

Scientific measurements all reveal that the overall growth in these leased forests exceeds the cut plus all other losses. This excess of growth serves to increase the standing volume of pulpwood which, in most instances, will render the acreage more productive and so permit larger annual harvests to meet the growing needs of the future.

The National Forests

The inventory of productive forests which cover a quarter of Canada's land area, is nearing completion. Simultaneously, a large quantity of new

information relating to growth rates in the productive forests is being assembled. Preliminary estimates indicate that annual growth rates over a considerable portion of the productive forests range as high as 25 to 40 cubic feet per acre. Annual depletion on the accessible productive forests, for which it is possible to give a more accurate figure, averages about 7 cubic feet per acre, and includes cutting and losses from fire.

This is not the whole story. This seemingly favourable balance on a national scale is tempered by the following conditions:

1. The annual depletion caused by insects and disease, for which reliable estimates do not exist, is believed to exceed the losses from fire.
2. Regional examples of over-cutting in the more accessible areas indicate that control and adjustment is necessary to bring cut in line with growth potential.
3. Greater costs may be encountered in developing more remote supply areas.

Table 9.
Cords, Cubic Feet, and Board Measure

A standard cord is a stack of wood 4 x 4 x 8 feet containing 128 cubic feet of wood, bark, and interstices. A cord usually contains about 85 cubic feet of solid wood, but the content varies with the size of the logs.

In the lumber industry, wood is usually measured by the board foot. A board foot is the equivalent of a board one inch in thickness and one square foot in surface area. The relationship between board measure and cord measure varies in different sections of the Dominion. Usually, 2 cords are considered to be equivalent to about 1000 feet board measure. But this ratio also varies with the size and type of the wood.

One cord of peeled pulpwood is equivalent to 1.125 cords of rough or unpeeled wood.

In the past, the basis and classification upon which exports of paper other than newsprint have been compiled have been modified from time to time. Consequently, only figures covering recent years are included in this and Tables 65 and 66.

Moreover, because they are compiled on a somewhat different basis, the two tables which follow are not comparable to the production figures in Tables 62 and 63.

Also, some of the exports go through a converting plant before shipment. Thus, many of the exports have a value enhanced by the conversion or packaging process, whereas the production figures show the valuation at the basic rate.

Again, the tonnage figures for certain paper products exported are not available. The dollar figures covering these exports will be found in the succeeding table under the heading "Paper Products".

Of the power generated by industry for its own use, the pulp and paper mills accounted for 39.7 per cent in 1955 and 22.7 per cent in 1956. Of the total consumption of electricity in Canada, the pulp and paper mills accounted for 21.1 per cent in 1955, 19.7 per cent in 1956 and 20.4 per cent in 1957. There are several single paper mills which alone consume more electric power than all the domestic customers in Montreal combined, indeed which use more power than is required to provide light for the city and all its residents. Notes: Since 1952, "value of factory shipments" has replaced "gross value of products" in all manufacturing industries except Sawmills, Aircraft and parts, Shipbuilding, Railway rolling stock, Bridge and structural steel works, Hydraulic cement, Clay products from domestic clay, Coke and gas products, Lime, Salt, Tobacco processing and packing, and Publishing (only) of periodicals; also Pulp and paper and Veneer and plywood until 1956. As inventories are relatively small in the industries for which factory shipments are used, the general comparability of the figures is not seriously affected.

The gross value of products or of factory shipments given above, is limited to the annual production of commodities, and is not comparable with "gross national product" given in Table 72, which includes transportation, communication, trade, finance, and service activities. The computation is entirely different and the "gross national product" comprises, in addition, depreciation allowances, other similar business costs, and indirect taxes less subsidies.

While the statistics of gross production are of interest, indicating the amount of revenue generated by the corporations and operators in the field, the total includes a large element of duplication: often the products of one industry become the materials of other industries. The net value of production obtained by deducting the cost of materials, fuel and electricity is a more accurate measure of the contribution to the national economy.

The value of agricultural production includes forest production on farmers' wood lots. As such products are also reported under forestry, the amount of duplication is deducted.

A survey of production must differentiate between the more important branches and at the same time present a grand total that will be free from over-lapping. For example, the products of pulp and paper mills and sawmills are included in forestry production as being the first finished products of commercial value resulting from the productive process. They may, however, be classified under manufactures in view of the nature of the production process. The production of such industries is regarded both as primary and secondary, but the duplication is eliminated from the grand total.
