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Notes to the Tables

These Reference Tables are published annually as a statistical review of the Canadian pulp and paper industry, its growth and development, its place in the Canadian economy, and its position in the great world industry of which it forms so significant a part.

For some products, the figures in the Tables differ somewhat from those in the monthly Statistical Bulletin, also published by the Canadian Pulp and Paper Association. One of the reasons is that Dominion Bureau of Statistics grade classifications are slightly different, in a few instances, from those of the Canadian Pulp and Paper Association and the Newsprint Association of Canada. In addition, the monthly Statistical Bulletin does not include statistics for several companies which are not members of CPPA. These companies account for some two per cent of the total pulp and paper output in Canada.

All quantities in the Tables are in short tons of 2,000 pounds and, for wood pulp, are expressed on an air-dry basis.

For the preparation of these tables grateful acknowledgement is made to L. J. Pouliot, formerly chief of the Forestry Section of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, Ottawa.
