

FOREWORD

THIS record of the organization, accomplishments and growth of the National Industrial Conference Board during its twenty-ninth year may serve not merely to emphasize once more for its Associates and the public the strength and continuity of purpose and method that have marked the work of this institution since it was founded nearly a full generation ago. It may emphasize as well the intensified and expanded importance of that purpose in the period of profound and far-reaching change which lies ahead for America as for the rest of a war-wasted world.

Through almost thirty years of war, prosperity and depression, the Board's efforts and its faith have been steadfastly devoted to helping in the preservation, development and improvement in America of an economic order based on voluntary productive enterprise, carried forward under a political order founded on representative constitutional government and civil liberty. The Board has always believed that these principles of economic and political life provide the strongest safeguard of social welfare and national security and the greatest assurance of material prosperity and spiritual progress for the American people; and it has assumed, as it must, that all who have been associated with its work have shared the same clear conviction and sure confidence in them. With firm faith that they are finally confirmed and supported by the tested facts of human experience and scientific investigation, the Board's fundamental aim and method have always been to ascertain and assemble these facts objectively, to make them fully and widely known, and to promote in every possible way the intelligent and honest application of facts to all problems of public and private action which affect those principles.

Today, for all who share in this faith and this effort, the task is more difficult and more vital than ever before in the Board's history. In both public and private policy these principles are being challenged or repudiated, and the facts which support them ignored or denied. Deliberately by design, unknowingly through indifference, or unwillingly under compulsion, much of the world has turned back in thought and aspiration to ideas and purposes of economic and political organization which, though implemented with the mechanisms of modern science, have their roots none the less in the ancient and primitive past of feudal serfdom and mili-

tary imperialism. Whatever its military or diplomatic outcome, it is plain that the principle of unlimited government has won this war, in America as elsewhere in the world, and men have everywhere been moved or driven to abandon the voluntary economy of creative individual enterprise and personal responsibility for an economy of compulsory security, mass dependency and State dictation. By what is perhaps the most perfect and tragic paradox of history, thirty years of world war in the name of freedom have ended in its destruction in almost every country on earth, and for all who still believe in its creative power, the age-old struggle for human liberty has begun all over again.

As always before, this will be a struggle of ideas, a contest of truth and error, in which knowledge will be the strongest weapon and facts the final arbiter. To meet its full responsibility in this period of conflict and confusion, THE CONFERENCE BOARD will be compelled inescapably to concern itself not only with the surface facts of economic life but also with the dynamic ideas which underlie the struggle for freedom that faces all of us henceforth as members of the American community. To do this in the days of doubt, delusion and deception that lie ahead, all who are associated with the Board and its work will need to renew and fortify their faith in its fundamental purpose.

To its Associates and many others whose interest and support have sustained this purpose in the past, this report is dedicated with deep appreciation and with high hope and confidence that the Board can count upon them in the future.

THE NATURE AND PURPOSES OF THE CONFERENCE BOARD

WHAT THE BOARD IS

THE NATIONAL INDUSTRIAL CONFERENCE BOARD is an institution for scientific research, professional education, practical service, and public information in the field of business economics and business management. Its purpose is to promote the prosperity and security of the American people by assisting in the effective operation and sound development of voluntary productive enterprise in the United States.

In pursuance of this purpose its specific function is continuously to assemble, analyze, and present accurate, complete, and useful information regarding economic conditions and management experience in the United States and other countries, and to distribute such information systematically among business executives and others interested in it.

To perform this function the Board maintains a large staff of specialists engaged in continuous research in economic statistics and management technique; it operates a widely-used public information bureau; it provides specific information service for individuals, organizations, and business concerns; it conducts periodic conferences of business executives and professional specialists for discussion of economic and management problems; it normally exchanges information with correspondents in many foreign countries; and it issues numerous periodical and other publications in which the results of its research and conference activities are made available for general use.

The Board thus serves as a central instrument of research, a clearing-house of information, an informal agency of professional education, and a medium of common understanding and coordinated effort for American business management.

The Board is a scientific institution. Its first task is to ascertain, analyze and present objectively the facts about business. It tests in every possible way the sources, basis, method, completeness and accuracy of all information which it uses and makes available to others.

The Board is an institution for practical service. The Board's work is designed to assist business management in the effective performance of its tasks and the sound solution of its problems by helping it to increase its knowledge, experience, and capacity, and by contributing to public information and understanding regarding business enterprise.

The Board is a nonprofit institution. It is supported cooperatively by subscriptions for its services and publications, and its income is devoted wholly to maintaining and improving its services. Special statistical and other research work done for individuals, concerns, and organizations is charged for at cost.

The Board is a wholly independent institution. It is not connected with any other institution or association, and its work is not determined or influenced by any organization or group, academic, professional, industrial, commercial or political. It assumes sole responsibility for the information it furnishes and for its interpretation of such information.

WHAT THE BOARD IS NOT

The Board is not a governmental agency. Its services and publications are always available to government bureaus, public officials, and legislators; representatives of certain government departments serve as Members of the Board; and it cooperates with government bureaus in scientific work; but it has no political affiliations of any kind.

The Board is not a trade association. Its interest is not confined to any special fields of industry, business, or finance. Its services are open to persons and organizations in all branches of industry, trade, and finance, to all professions, and to all individuals and institutions who are interested in its work and contribute to its maintenance.

The Board is not an employers' organization. It does not represent the interest of employers, owners, or investors as distinguished from that of employees. Its concern is solely

with the effective management and operation of productive enterprise, in which all these groups participate. Persons and organizations of many different interests, including employers, investors, labor unions, professional managers, engineers, students, teachers, writers, and government officials, make use of its services, which are accessible to all who cooperate in maintaining them.

The Board is not an endowed institution. It supports itself from year to year on a cooperative basis, through voluntary contributions and subscriptions for its services and publications by business concerns, by individuals, and by organizations. These contributions and subscriptions, differing widely in amount, form the fluctuating fund of resources that maintain the Board's services.

The Board is not an academic bureau for abstract statistical research or theoretical economic discussion. Its organization is designed to combine special technical knowledge with practical experience. Its work is rooted in the realities of business activity, and is concerned with the actual facts and concrete problems of business enterprise which confront management, labor and the public from day to day.

The Board is not a branch, affiliate, subsidiary, agency, or department of any other organization, association, or institution. Its activities are wholly independent of and do not in any way duplicate those of any other organization.

The Board is not a political propaganda or legislative lobbying organization. The results of its work are made available to the public and to government for such use as may be made of them. While individuals associated with the Board express their views as American citizens on public questions, the Board, as an institution, does not engage in legislative or political activities of any kind. It is concerned primarily with the policies and practices of business enterprise, and the conditions which affect them.

The essential objective of THE CONFERENCE BOARD is to ascertain the trustworthy and significant facts of economic and management experience, to test their validity, to explain their significance, to make them understood by business management through constant mutual contact and conference, and to publish them, so that the public, government

officials, and legislators may likewise understand them. THE CONFERENCE BOARD holds that knowledge of facts and understanding of their significance by business management, investors, workers, legislators, and the public are of supreme importance to economic progress. It believes that honest effort to ascertain facts, explain their meaning, and promote general understanding of them will ultimately lead to sound private and public policy.

PRINCIPLES OF THE BOARD'S WORK

Scrupulous preservation of scientific objectivity, and avoidance of association with partisan organizations or political movements, is the first of the fundamental principles upon which the organization and the work of the Board have been based.

The second basic principle upon which the Board proceeds is that of the supreme importance to the public welfare of protecting, strengthening, and developing the organization of voluntary productive enterprise in the United States.

Its existence and activities are based upon the principle that the advancement, expansion, and effective operation of the productive enterprise of the nation are the primary and indispensable condition of social welfare and national progress; and that the essential function of government is to maintain conditions that promote and foster the development of the voluntary enterprise organization and the productive resources of the community.

The third basic principle upon which the Board operates is that of emphasizing and promoting the coordination of American enterprise as a whole for intelligent management and control of its own affairs. The Board believes that in our complex, constantly changing, and rapidly developing industrial society, the management of business enterprise on the basis of knowledge, understanding, and coordinated effort is indispensable for stable economic progress. It believes that this task must be performed by the enterprise organization itself and cannot be left to government employees.

The fourth essential principle behind the Board's work is its emphasis on the value and necessity of combining scientific or technical research with practical experience and judgment

of industrial and business executives who have spent many years dealing with specific, concrete problems of management in their own enterprises. The Board's work is based upon the belief that neither academic investigation nor practical business experience can stand alone and separate in face of the complex problems arising in the rapid development of our modern economic system. Both for successful practical procedure in dealing with problems of management and for sound public policies affecting business, a combination of both these elements is necessary. This combination, which is embodied in the organization and activities of THE CONFERENCE BOARD, makes it a unique institution in American business and professional life.

II

THE ORGANIZATION AND OPERATION OF THE CONFERENCE BOARD

IN performing its functions as a research, educational, and service institution, the present organization of the Board consists of its Subscribing and Cooperating Associates, Affiliated Organizations, and Foreign Correspondents; its Members, Officers, Trustees, and official committees; its advisory groups; and its Research and Administrative Staff. All these parts of the organization participate in various ways in the research and educational activities of the Board.

ASSOCIATES OF THE BOARD

Subscribing Associates

Individuals, business concerns, associations, and educational institutions or governmental departments, bureaus or agencies subscribing annually for the services, facilities, and publications of the Board, or contributing toward their maintenance, constitute its Subscribing Associates, and are the basis of its support. They receive the publications of the Board, and have the privilege of using its information and library facilities, consulting its Staff, and attending its general meetings and special conferences. A list of Subscribing Associates of the Board is published in Part II of this Report.

At the close of the fiscal year 1944-45 the Associates of the Board included 50 individuals who subscribed personally for its services and publications; 2,116 business concerns, representing every field of business activity, in all parts of the country, who formed the bulk of the Subscribing Associates of the Board; 176 business and labor organizations; and 170 libraries, educational and other public institutions. The total number of Associates increased from 2,287 to 2,512 during the fiscal year ended April 30, 1945.

Cooperating Associates

Individuals, business concerns and others who participate in the research work of the Board by regularly furnishing information for use in its studies of the cost of living, wages, employment, working hours, management practices, business conditions and other subjects of systematic investigation by the Board constitute its Cooperating Associates. Whether or not they contribute or subscribe toward the financial support of the Board's work, its Cooperating Associates obviously play a vitally important part in the maintenance and expansion of its services as a cooperative institution, in which information and experience are pooled for the benefit of business enterprise and the public. The Board is deeply indebted to them for their interest and participation, which have enabled it to develop its studies and render its services on a more economical and practical basis than would otherwise have been possible within the limits of its financial resources.

The scope of this cooperation is constantly being expanded as its mutual benefits are appreciated. Currently the number of Cooperating Associates of the Board in all the fields of its work amounts to nearly 12,000, and the map facing page 8 shows their wide geographic distribution.

AFFILIATED ORGANIZATIONS

Under the By-Laws of the Board certain organizations and institutions are accepted by the Board as Affiliated Organizations. These now include, first, a number of divisions of the War and Navy Departments directly concerned with manufacturing operations and with industrial development from the point of view of national defense; and, second, a number of national trade associations and state or regional industrial associations which subscribe stipulated minimum amounts for the maintenance of the services and facilities of the Board. These Affiliated Organizations, listed in Part II, designate representatives who, upon election by the Board, serve as Members of the Board with the same privileges and responsibilities as other Members.

The first group of Affiliated Organizations, in view of the great value of their cooperation in the work of the Board,

are not required to contribute financially to its support. Among the Affiliated Organizations of the Board and their designates, those of the bureaus of the War and Navy Departments have been at all times especially helpful in its work, and the Board makes grateful acknowledgment to them for their constructive cooperation. It hopes that in the course of time other departments of government and other public agencies may similarly be brought into closer association with its work.

During the past twenty-nine years almost all the important national trade associations, and many state industrial associations, have at one time or another been Affiliated Organizations of the Board, but many of these affiliations have lapsed from time to time with changes in the resources and in the leadership of these associations. The Board hopes that, in view of the increasingly important part the trade associations should play in dealing with economic and management problems, many other organizations will be brought into closer cooperation with the Board's work in this way.

FOREIGN CORRESPONDENTS

Foreign Correspondents of the Board have been appointed from time to time from among leaders in industry, commerce, finance, as well as statesmen and economists in the principal foreign countries. These have supplied to the Board information regarding economic conditions in their respective countries, as a basis for the Board's reports on international affairs, and have received from the Board similar information regarding developments in the United States. Because of present world conditions, this interchange of information and close collaboration in the study of international problems have necessarily been interrupted in the case of several nations, and in view of the uncertainties of international relations the Board's contact with many of its Foreign Correspondents has been temporarily suspended.

COUNCILLORS

From time to time outstanding personalities in the fields of science, education, public affairs, and business are elected to membership in the Board as Councillors. These elections

are essentially honorary in character and are made on the basis of the distinction of the individuals chosen, irrespective of their association with the Board as subscribers or otherwise, or of their direct connection with industry. The Board avails itself of their advice as may be needed in connection with broader questions of policy in the conduct of its work.

As of June 1, 1945 the Councillors, listed in Part II, numbered 19.

MEMBERS OF THE BOARD

Members of the Board consist of the designates of Affiliated Organizations, the Councillors, and a number of individuals connected in important capacities with some of the Subscribing Associates of the Board. Membership in the Board is personal, and by election, and the number of regular Members is limited to two hundred. Some of the Members of the Board do not contribute financially to the maintenance of its work, and many of the Subscribing Associates of the Board—that is, those individuals, business concerns, organizations and institutions who are subscribers for the services of the Board—are not represented in the Board's membership. Qualified persons are elected or reelected from year to year by the existing membership of the Board to serve as Members on the basis of their intrinsic interest in its work and their disposition and capacity to participate personally in its activities. They constitute a relatively small but distinguished group of men active in business, public, or educational affairs and earnestly devoted to the work in which the Board is engaged. As of June 1, 1945, the Members of the Board, including Councillors and representatives of Affiliated Organizations, numbered 219.

OFFICERS AND TRUSTEES

The Members constituted as described above, elect annually in the usual procedure a group of Trustees. The Trustees are divided into three classes of ten members each, so arranged that the membership of respective classes shall expire in succeeding years.

These Trustees, in addition to selecting their own chairman, elect annually a Chairman of the Board, one or more

Vice-Chairmen, a President, a Treasurer and a Secretary. The Trustees are the executive agency of the Members in the conduct of the Board's affairs. They nominate, for election or reelection by the Board, the Members of the Board, and appoint its Foreign Correspondents and the various committees and advisory councils required in the conduct of the Board's work.

STANDING AND SPECIAL COMMITTEES

The following standing and special committees of the Board were in operation during the fiscal year 1944-45, for the purposes indicated:

Standing Committee on Invitations, to consider and officially to issue any invitations extended to eligible persons to accept election by the Board as Members or Councillors, or appointment as Foreign Correspondents. The Committee also advises with Affiliated Organizations regarding representatives of such organizations to serve as Members of the Board, except in the case of the designates of governmental bureaus, who are nominated directly by the Secretary of War and the Secretary of the Navy;

Standing Finance Committee, to advise with the President and the Trustees regarding the financial administration of the Board;

Standing Committee on Reelections and Admissions, to advise with the President regarding his recommendations for elections and reelections of Members and Councillors and appointment of Foreign Correspondents of the Board.

In addition to these, several special committees were created, and either completed or continued consideration of various questions arising in the course of the Board's work.

The Board makes earnest acknowledgment of the fine service rendered to it by these committees. The time and energy given to their work by the Members of the Board and others, in the midst of their own pressing private preoccupations and responsibilities, bear high testimony to their public-spirited devotion to the purposes of the Board.

CONFERENCES

Meetings of the Board

Meetings of THE CONFERENCE BOARD are held regularly each month, except during the summer, for intimate and informal discussion of current developments and problems relating to business. These conferences are not mere meetings for the usual transaction of formal organization business. The discussion at these conferences is based upon and guided by the research work and the information currently developed by the Research Staff of the Board, and in turn the investigations of the Research Staff and the publications prepared by it are aided and guided by these discussions.

Five of these monthly conferences, on alternate months beginning in September, are usually general meetings to which executives of all concerns and organizations associated with the Board are invited. The other four meetings of the Board are sessions of the Members, their guests, and others invited to confer with them.

The general meetings of the Board on alternate months are preceded by a number of round table conferences devoted to specific subjects, in the discussion of which the consulting groups and Staff of the Board take part.

Special Conferences

In addition to its regular monthly Meetings, THE CONFERENCE BOARD endeavors to meet the needs of its Subscribing Associates for specialized types of information by organizing discussion groups to consider particular problems that arise as a result of economic developments or government policy. Three of the more important of such conferences held during the past year indicate the character of these activities:

“Seniority and Reemployment of War Veterans,” held at the Waldorf-Astoria, was attended by nearly one thousand management and personnel executives;

“Union Management Cooperation in a Job Evaluation Installation,” held in the Board’s offices;

“The Working Conference on Section 722,” also held in the Board’s Offices. This group, which from time to time meets to discuss excess-profits tax relief as provided by

Section 722 of the Internal Revenue Code, is composed of accounting and legal tax practitioners as well as interested economists and controllers of companies associated with THE CONFERENCE BOARD.

Advisory Councils

In order to bring to bear in the conduct of the Board's research and conference work the knowledge and experience of specialists and technicians in the various fields covered, the Board has had the benefit of the assistance of important advisory groups. One such group that was organized over 20 years ago is the *Advisory Council on Management Research*, composed of men distinguished for their special knowledge and experience in the field of personnel and labor relations administration.

STAFF ORGANIZATION

The Board's Research and Administrative Staff must serve in a two-fold capacity. It must continue and constantly improve the quantity and quality of the Board's research as problems vitally affecting industry and business multiply and become more complex. It must also be available at all times for consultation by mail, telephone, telegraph and in person by its Subscribing Associates who seek special information or the direction of available material to their particular problems. Moreover, during the war period, requests from governmental and Army and Navy sources have greatly increased and as a public service THE CONFERENCE BOARD has tried to be helpful to the limit of its capacity. All these demands on its time have kept the Staff under considerable pressure, but it welcomes the opportunity to be of increasing usefulness to the progressive companies that make up its roster of Subscribing Associates.

Staff departments work systematically with the consulting groups of the Board in carrying out the research, publication and conference activities of the Board. Close contact of specialists of the Staff with its Associates is maintained through correspondence, group discussions, personal conferences, and field visits to offices and plants of Associates. In this way the Board's Staff organization serves as a unique

instrument for investigation, contact, exchange of experience, and cooperative education in economics and management.

This effort will be continued and intensified, as the resources of the Board and war conditions permit, and it is hoped that in the course of time the Board's organization can be developed into a systematic mechanism of management education, nation-wide in its scope and continuous in its influence.

The regular operating Staff of THE CONFERENCE BOARD consisted of 129 Staff Associates on June 1, 1945, organized under the following Divisions:¹

The Division of Business Practices is responsible for the analysis and interpretation of business experience in dealing with current problems of administration outside the field of personnel and labor relations;

The Division of Business Statistics is responsible for the analysis and interpretation of statistical records and trends affecting business and industrial operation;

The Division of Management Research is responsible for the analysis and interpretation of experience in dealing with practical problems of personnel and industrial relations administration and other matters of plant and office operating technique;


The Division of Labor Statistics is responsible primarily for the Board's investigations in the fields of wages, employment and unemployment, and the cost of living, as well as for special investigations in these fields;

The Division of Conference Activities is responsible for planning and conducting the Regular Meetings of the Board and its other conference activities;

The Information Service Division, which includes the Reference Library, is responsible for replying to the constant stream of inquiries by mail, telephone and visits from Associates and the general public;

The Publications Division, which is responsible for editing and printing the numerous periodical and other publications of the Board, and for providing information regarding the results of its studies for the newspaper and magazine press;

The Service Extension Division, which is responsible for increasing the number of the Board's Subscribing Associates, thus extending the usefulness of its work and enabling it to expand the scope of its services;

The Division of Accounting and Office Service, the functions of which are indicated by its title; and

The Administrative Division, responsible for planning, general supervision, and coordination of the work of the Staff and its relations to Associates and the public.

THE BOARD'S SUPPORT

The Board is not an endowed institution, and it has so far not been assisted by any of the established foundations. It has had to earn its living and pay its way by its work from year to year. As a non-profit institution, the Board does not provide its services and distribute its publications on a commercial basis, nor can it afford to employ a large sales or promotion organization to bring its services and publications to the favorable consideration of possible subscribers. Its resources must be devoted to its research, information and conference activities and to the maintenance of effective contact with the Associates whom it serves.

The regular research work of THE CONFERENCE BOARD and the ordinary expenses incident to conduct of its conference activities are financed mainly by voluntary subscriptions and contributions by individuals, corporations and organizations associated with the Board. These subscriptions vary widely in amount, cover no uniform period, are renewable irregularly throughout the year, and are based partly on the direct usefulness of the services rendered by the Board's staff and partly on public-spirited interest in its support as an institution. Continuous correspondence and contact are necessary to maintain and add to subscriptions. This work occupies a considerable part of the time and energy

of the Staff, but the absence of any assurance of stable financial support by endowment or otherwise is a constant and sharp stimulus to the Board to make its service effective and useful.

In addition to subscriptions of Associates, the work of the Board is supported by income from the sale of publications and from special service rendered individual corporations and organizations, by way of occasional statistical work, investigations, and information. Sales of publications are restricted to individuals and educational institutions that could not regularly subscribe to the Board, and barely cover the expense of printing, with no allowance for cost of their preparation. Since the Board is chartered as a non-profit institution, revenue from special service can cover only the direct expense involved and a strictly allocated proportion of the overhead costs of operating the organization.

Under these conditions the income of the Board fluctuates widely and irregularly throughout each year, while its ordinary expenses are relatively stable because of the sustained nature of its research and conference work and the highly qualified personnel necessary to carry it on. So far as possible, expenditures are carefully budgeted in relation to estimated income at the outset of each fiscal year, while both income and expenses are accounted for on an accrual basis, and closely controlled by a cost system covering all its operations.

For twenty-nine years, through periods of widely varying business prosperity and vast changes in economic and political conditions, the work of **THE CONFERENCE BOARD** has gone forward steadily. Its books, reports, studies, and periodicals, which it has published during this period are merely the physical monument or record of its work, far less important than the constant service of current information and education which it has rendered to American enterprise.

American enterprise urgently needs and is abundantly able to provide for itself a central instrument of tested information, common understanding, effective education, and unified action such as **THE CONFERENCE BOARD** in principle implies. For the perfection of this instrument it can afford to enlist the services of the ablest minds in practical business experience,

in economic, statistical, and management science, in public and professional education, in public relations, and in government. To make this instrument effective it can afford to construct a comprehensive and systematic mechanism for the continuous information, education, and coordination of management and the public so that the facts of our economic and industrial life may be fully and widely known and be acted upon by management, the public, and government with intelligence, understanding, integrity, and unity of purpose.

Such an effort is long overdue. The need for it increases day by day. Even after twenty-nine years of THE CONFERENCE BOARD's work a beginning has hardly been made. The war and the conditions which will follow it make an effort of this kind more urgent and vital than ever before.

III

THE SERVICES AND PUBLICATIONS OF THE CONFERENCE BOARD

DURING recent years THE CONFERENCE BOARD has planned its research, service and publications with two major ends in view: first, to supply its Associates with the authoritative and up-to-date information needed to help them meet their responsibilities and solve their problems during the various phases of the war emergency; second, to maintain its important continuing studies in order to provide the Associates with a longer view of the trends in the nation's economic development and in managerial policies and functions.


A. Information and Consultation Service

The successful functioning of private enterprise is dependent in large part upon the availability of accurate and up-to-date information. THE CONFERENCE BOARD endeavors to fill that need not alone through its publications, but also by maintaining an Information Service Division whose function it is to furnish prompt answers to inquiries and to provide a clearing-house of general information for all Conference Board Associates. In connection with that service, an extensive library is maintained which comprises what is probably the largest private collection of books, governmental reports and documents, periodicals, and other material covering the broad field of industrial economics. This library material is available to all Associates for use in the library or on a loan basis.


During the past fiscal year a total of 22,531 inquiries was answered by Staff Associates. This represented an increase of 6,012 over last year. Subscribing Associates accounted for 18,722 of these inquiries, while nonsubscribers accounted for

only 3,809. Of these nonsubscriber inquiries a substantial number was received from government agencies, members of educational institutions, and writers. All such inquiries from business organizations were handled by the Service Extension Division with a view to future participation in the financial support of THE CONFERENCE BOARD.

The Information Service Division, as the channel through which passes the greatest number of requests for information, handled directly a total of 9,514 inquiries, an increase of 2,171. These inquiries comprised 4,092 telephone calls, 650 interviews, 4,717 letters, and 55 telegrams. The Library was used by 565 visitors and material was loaned in 453 instances.

In addition, the Division routed a large number of inquiries dealing with specialized problems concerning renegotiation, excess-profits taxes, collective bargaining, pensions and similar matters to Staff Associates covering the particular fields concerned.

The Library facilities of the Division are utilized extensively by Staff Associates engaged in research activity. Publications are secured from other libraries for the use of such Associates, and material in their respective fields is called to their attention.


The Library has, in the past, gradually accumulated a large collection of books and pamphlets, to which several thousand additional items were added during the year by purchase, gift, or exchange. In order to accommodate these, certain material considered obsolete has been discarded. Subscriptions are regularly maintained for more than one hundred periodicals, services, and annual publications.

B. Conference Activities

During the fiscal year, 1944-45, the Board devoted five of its regular monthly meetings to open sessions for Members, Associates, and their guests, and arranged four closed sessions for Members of the Governing Body. In anticipation of the end of the war in Europe, the sessions during this period dealt, in the main, with reconversion problems.

In compliance with requests from the Office of Defense Transportation and other government agencies concerned,

WHERE THE FACTS COME FROM

Since THE CONFERENCE BOARD initiated its fact-finding activities in 1916, the number of companies and organizations regularly cooperating with the Board has grown from a mere handful to a total of 12,000. Detailed statistics are furnished by these Cooperating Associates to the Research Staff of the Board on hundreds of items which enter into the computation of its indexes of the Cost of Living; Wages and Hours of Work; Employment; Survey of Clerical Salary Rates; Productive Capacity; and Corporate Earnings.

In addition, the Research Staff, in cooperation with the Associates of the Board, conducts periodic surveys on many subjects, such as personnel practices, industrial relations, executive opinion on business experience, conditions and prospects, business practices, and the influence of governmental activities on business enterprise.

Several hundred concerns provide the Research Staff of the Board with monthly reports and other material on changes in business operations, the magnitude and effects of labor shortages, costs of production, and on the effects of emergency regulations.

* * *

Cooperation with Conference Board research is on a purely voluntary basis. No fees are paid to cooperators, whose sole interest in pooling information is to provide business enterprise with a continuous stream of authentic material for its self-guidance.

* * *

The success of this extensive system of cooperation has been made possible only by the high degree of confidence placed in THE CONFERENCE BOARD as an independent, fact-finding institution. This confidence has been so jealously guarded by the Board's Staff that not once during the quarter-century of the Board's existence has there been an instance of misuse of data provided by its Cooperating Associates. Procedures are followed which guarantee that all schedules and questionnaires shall be held strictly confidential; neither information nor names are ever divulged without the specific written permission of the Cooperating Associate.

The principal change in the Board's publications during the past year was the conversion of *The Conference Board Economic Record* into *American Affairs*, a quarterly journal of thought and opinion edited by Mr. Garet Garrett.

The Board has continued to issue its regular monthly publications, *The Conference Board Business Record*, and *The Conference Board Management Record*, and its *Industry Record* studies, in "Wartime Editions," embodying numerous changes in format to assist in the paper conservation program.

The Board has endeavored to supply its Associates with information helpful in their policy-making and operations under war conditions, but increasing attention is being given to contract termination, cutbacks, reconversion, reemployment, and shifts in population due to the war, and to the multitude of problems that will confront business in the period of readjustment to peacetime production and distribution.

D. Public Information

THE CONFERENCE BOARD is quoted in some newspaper or magazine practically every day of the year. Several times weekly, releases are prepared on the Board's current studies or on articles appearing in the Board's publications. These releases are sent to the press associations, to an extensive list of newspapers in every part of the country, and to leading financial and trade journals. The releases are not infrequently used two and more times by a single newspaper or news agency: as news, first, and then as bases for editorials and "feature" columns and stories.

Among the larger newspapers which have regularly utilized the Board's releases are *The New York Times*, *New York Herald-Tribune*, *Wall Street Journal*, *New York Sun*, *Hartford Courant*, *Christian Science Monitor*, *Baltimore Sun*, *Washington Post*, *Cleveland Plain-Dealer*, *Chicago Tribune* and *Chicago News*, *St. Louis Post-Dispatch*, *Atlanta Constitution*, *Dallas News*, *Los Angeles Times* and *San Francisco Examiner*.

The influence of the big-city dailies has often extended, through their syndicates, far beyond the range of their huge circulations.

Special releases have also been prepared each month on the Board's cost of living estimates for newspapers in twenty-seven of the cities which cooperate in this study.

Special mention should be made of the nation-wide attention afforded the speakers at the Board's 29th Annual Meeting. These sessions—the only meetings that were open to the press—were widely reported.

Testimony to the long-term value of Conference Board research is found in the wide use which has been made in books and articles of the Board's studies of past years.

Another means by which the public has been kept informed of Conference Board findings has been through reviews in

newspapers and magazines of "The Economic Almanac for 1944-45" Public speakers and radio commentators frequently refer to Conference Board data and to Conference Board releases.

In all, three hundred and eighty-one separate releases were sent out during the Board's past fiscal year. These releases were published in newspapers with an aggregate circulation of many millions and were of great value in popularizing the Board's research findings.

E. The Board's Flexible Research Program

In no period of American history has business management faced such a rapid change in its problems. Hardly a phase of business operations can be relegated to routine procedures.

Business management must act on facts. THE CONFERENCE BOARD, with an eye to changing conditions in the national scene, adjusts its program to serve the practical needs of its Subscribing Associates.

Reconversion, with all of the besetting difficulties the word implies, is at hand. Helpful information, based on studies scientifically conducted, will be developed by the Board's four research divisions.

The Division of Business Statistics: The geographic and regional pattern of American industry has been drastically altered under the war economy. Major emphasis in the research activities of the Division of Business Statistics during the coming year will be focused upon a continuing examination of these changes and their underlying significance to American business. As reconversion grows and cut-backs mount, increasing requests for material regarding regional business activity are anticipated. Reconversion unemployment will be particularly concentrated in war-mushroomed areas. Wide variations will exist in the elasticity of the labor

supply, and there will be a vital interest in the progress of re-employment in these depressed localities and in geographic differentials in labor costs.

The Division has already prepared to meet this demand for information by assembling available data on the trends in regional activity, including such measures as bank debits, electric power consumption, telephone installations, automobile registrations and other revealing series. To meet the growing interest in the intensive exploration of domestic markets, studies are also being prepared of capital investment in the various states and localities, trends in output per man hour and in unit labor costs for major industry groups—by geographic areas wherever possible, and on other significant economic variations between industrial sectors.

Interest has also mounted in international comparisons of labor costs, productivity, standards of living, wages and prices. During the past three decades the Board has assembled in its files a wealth of material bearing upon these comparisons and these will be brought up-to-date and augmented as foreign material, hitherto shut off by the war, becomes available for study. Plans are currently under way for the appointment of foreign correspondents in important foreign countries, a practice already well established until its discontinuance became necessary at the start of the war. Through this mechanism, the research contributions of the Board will be made available on an international basis and, in return, a steady stream of reliable information and opinion regarding economic conditions abroad will be received by the Board and passed on to its Associates.

In addition to its regular reporting activities, the Division of Business Statistics during the past year has been engaged in bringing to completion the first of a proposed series of industry basebooks. The initial volume of this new member of the Board's Almanac family will be devoted exclusively to the petroleum industry. With the completion of this pioneer study, the Division will move on to other major industries, having in mind the long-term objective of a series of convenient and authoritative basebooks of industrial data for each of the key sectors of American enterprise.

For many months the Division has also been engaged in

the preparation of an elaborate corporate sample from which current trends in corporate income, operating costs, and profits can be more readily and authoritatively determined. As in the case of regional measures, the objective here is to provide significant economic data suitable for business planning, on as rapid and convenient a reporting schedule as possible.

Another important sector of exploration by the Division in the months ahead is the continuing study of public and private housing, particularly with respect to the provision of housing for low-income groups. The first of these studies, "Public vs. Private Housing," has already directed national attention to the growing volume of government subsidization in housing, and the impact of this growth upon the provision of low-rent homes by private builders. Significant industrial developments will continue to be analyzed in the Board's industry studies in *The Conference Board Industry Record* and *The Conference Board Business Record*, with increasing attention to new technological developments and the introduction of new products.

Continuing the preparation of studies sponsored by The Scherman Foundation, the Division has steadily expanded its analysis of the significance of imports, with particular regard to the effect of imports upon employment and domestic business activity. To date, some twenty-five reports have been prepared for key industries, in which imports directly or indirectly condition the volume of employment. A like number of surveys are contemplated for the coming year.

The Division of Business Practices: This Division was organized in 1944 for the purpose of collecting and disseminating to the Associates of THE CONFERENCE BOARD data and information on prevailing corporate practices in the fields of administrative policy, financial policy, and manufacturing and distributive techniques. Information is drawn from all reliable sources, but the most important are the large number of companies and organizations which regularly cooperate with the Board by supplying their data and experience. This practical and up-to-the-minute information is analyzed and interpreted by a staff of qualified specialists and the results are made available to Cooperators and Sub-

scribing Associates either through the Board's *Studies in Business Policy* or through shorter surveys and analyses appearing in *The Conference Board Business Record*.

During its first year of operation the activities of the Division of Business Practices have been concentrated largely on the problems that will confront industry in the coming reconstruction and reconversion period. Several surveys have been made and conferences have been held on postwar marketing problems, and the results of these have been published in part in *Studies in Business Policy* No. 3, "Rebuilding Industry's Sales Organization." Work is under way on two further studies in the field of distribution: one will examine in detail the organization, activities and techniques employed by Market Research Departments in private industry; the other will analyze methods used in setting up sales territories. Other organizational problems being studied, and on which reports will be released during the summer, include a thorough analysis of cartels and international trade arrangements, and a study of the place of cooperatives in the American economy.

Corporate financial problems currently being covered by the Division include repricing of government contracts; tax relief, with special emphasis on relief under Section 722; budgetary control in industry; and company policies in compensating executives. A report has already been released on "Company Policies on Donations," *Studies in Business Policy*, No. 7.

The work of the Division of Business Practices will continue to emphasize reconversion problems in the year to come. Projects planned include such subjects as the role of industrial standardization in the postwar world; the organization and operation of an effective public relations program; the duties, responsibilities and remuneration of company directors; the problem of plant relocation; and company organization for foreign trade. By pooling the business experience and the practical opinions of the thousands of Cooperating Associates of THE CONFERENCE BOARD, the forward-looking reports which will come out of these studies should be of practical value to Subscribing Associates.

The staff of the Division of Business Practices is always

available to Associates for conference and consultation. During the past year many company executives have conferred with the Division's experts, especially with those in the fields of accounting, taxation, foreign trade and company organization. Frequently such consultations result in increased practical application to an industry's specific administrative problem of reports already issued or of unpublished data contained in the Division's files.

The Division of Management Research: The work of the Management Research Division covers the field of day-to-day operating routines and problems of factory and office which center primarily about human relations. These routines and problems are concerned with the relations between employers and employees, between employers and labor organizations, and between either or both and the government agencies established to regulate or supervise labor relations.

For the past five years the Division has concentrated on the task of aiding in the maximum utilization of America's vast manufacturing potential by making available accurate and timely information regarding the methods devised for dealing with many of the problems of plant operation or personnel administration that have either been created or intensified by war conditions. Now, however, when industry must continue to seek solutions for war production problems and at the same time attempt to be prepared to cope with postwar conditions, the Division is equipping itself to devote an increasing measure of its effort to the study of procedures for dealing effectively with the problems that are likely to assume prominence during the next few years.

In some instances the Division plans to conduct studies of practices and techniques which have largely but temporarily been displaced by the war and which may require new adaptations of the older procedures in order to secure the most equitable working relationship between management and employees under postwar conditions. At the same time through its constant contact with a large number of Associates and Cooperators the Division will engage in studies of new techniques and problems in such fields as training, compensation policy, collective bargaining, employee benefits, organizational structure and functions of the personnel

department, employee morale, and employment policies, particularly with respect to the reemployment of returning veterans.

The Division will continue to bring the results of its research to the Board's Associates through *The Conference Board Management Record*. The series of *Studies in Personnel Policy*, and "The Management Almanac," and through personal consultation, correspondence and telephone contacts. Serious consideration is also being given to again holding, perhaps on a more advanced level, the seminar courses in "Prevailing Practices in Personnel Administration" which were so well received in the four sessions held in January, February, March and April, 1945, and which were attended by more than 300 representatives of industry and labor. In these courses, if they are repeated, and in its research and conference activities it will be the aim of the Management Research Division to continue to bring to the Associates of the Board an unbiased and objective picture of company experience, experimental procedures, and new or special techniques in the field of industrial human relations.

The Division of Labor Statistics: As its name implies, this Division is concerned with the preparation and interpretation of many series of statistical data useful in the solution of problems arising from the handling of personnel. As conditions in the national scene change, it is imperative that management, labor and government alike have the facts in order to answer pressing questions speedily and adequately. Others who are interested in the problems of workers—economists, statisticians, students—also need reliable data if their work is to be constructive and fruitful.

The Division of Labor Statistics, as its principal function, regularly compiles and publishes statistical measures of trends affecting labor. These long-term series of data afford accurate measurements of current situations and afford the basis for comparisons with the past. Included among these measures are a number of Conference Board "firsts," such as the cost of living index for the United States and the hourly earnings and hours series for manufacturing industries. Regular compilations of statistical series from original survey sources are as follows:

1. Earnings and hours in 29 manufacturing industries (Monthly)
2. Earnings and hours in the production and distribution of gas and electricity (Semiannually)
3. Cost of living in the United States and 64 individual cities (Monthly)

Additional series derived from published sources are:

1. Earnings and hours on Class I Railroads (Monthly)
2. Wage rates of hired farm labor (Quarterly)
3. Origin of labor disputes (Monthly)

These measures are regularly published in detail in *The Conference Board Management Record*. They also appear in abridged form in *The Conference Board Business Record*, in "The Management Almanac," in "The Economic Almanac," and in such outside publications as *The Survey of Current Business* (United States Department of Commerce).

Besides these basic studies, the Division analyzes developments in its field for the information of the Board's Subscribing Associates. The most recent study of this type was "Standards of Living in Wage Negotiations."

Special investigations to aid in solving particular problems are made for Subscribing Associates. They cover the many aspects of labor statistics. Illustrations of this phase of the Division's work are:

1. Preparation of cost of living indexes for cities for which no indexes are currently published.
2. Studies of family expenditure habits.
3. Measurement of comparative living costs between localities.
4. Compilation of special-purpose retail price indexes.
5. Special analyses of wage data to provide information by industrial breakdowns or by geographical localities.

The Division has also prepared considerable special material for use in cases before the War Labor Board and in other price and wage proceedings. The number of such special investigations made, of course, is contingent upon the availability of time and personnel to conduct them.

The Division will continue to afford consultation service on the availability and use of labor statistics for the Board's Associates.

IV

TREASURER'S REPORT

For the Fiscal Year Ended April 30, 1945

To Members and Associates of THE CONFERENCE BOARD:

V-E DAY has come and gone. American business may well be proud of the contribution which it made toward the defeat of Germany. The tremendous quantities of matériel which it is now producing and must continue to produce tend to keep the losses of our men in the Armed Forces at a minimum, while helping to overwhelm our enemies in the Pacific. The full story of the production achievements of American business will probably never be told, but the results must fill every American with pride and satisfaction.

THE NATIONAL INDUSTRIAL CONFERENCE BOARD, like all business institutions, concentrated its efforts during the past year upon activities which were in support of the war effort. As this is a business report for the fiscal year 1944-1945, only the high spots of the financial aspects of the Board's operations will be reviewed.

The number of Subscribing Associates served by the Board has reached 2,512, an all-time high. Though a substantial part of the increase came during the war, there has been a continuous upward trend for twelve consecutive years, starting during the depths of the depression in 1933.

Gross operating income was \$681,940.17 in the fiscal year 1944-1945, an increase of \$80,620.68 over the year 1943-1944. Operating expenses during the past year increased \$80,024.04 over those of the preceding year, and totaled \$607,492.96. After providing \$50,000 out of the Operating Fund for long-range research and development, the Operating Fund balance for the year was \$24,447.21, of which \$20,000 was transferred to the Reserve Fund. Income ex-


ceeded the estimates in the budget, while the expenses were less than the estimates. Efficient management is responsible for these continued satisfactory results.

The foundation of the success of THE CONFERENCE BOARD is its ability to follow current trends of economic and social significance and to bring together the facts necessary to help business meet them. The foregoing figures reflect the appreciation by Associates of the alert and effective administration of Dr. Virgil Jordan and his Staff. Aside from the unprecedented amount of service which they have rendered to Subscribing Associates, they have initiated several new projects in the field of the Board's conference work and publications of high potential value from the standpoint of the future welfare of business. In the course of these achievements they encountered the same problems as confronted management generally, such as the loss of valuable personnel and rising operating costs. In spite of these difficulties, they have operated on an economical basis and in a thoroughly business-like manner.

Economic tides are bound to ebb and flow. Accordingly, it is necessary for business to build reserves, when funds are available, to help maintain essential operations during periods of depression. Regarding this as axiomatic, THE CONFERENCE BOARD has given continued attention to the expansion of its Reserve Fund. At the end of the fiscal year this amounted to \$449,472.41, an increase of \$56,280.56 over the preceding year. Most of this increase came from additional contributions by Subscribing Associates. As the value of the Reserve Fund, in terms of the current purchasing power of the dollar, is materially less than it seems, additional contributions will be most welcome.

A word about the care of the Reserve Fund. As this is viewed as a trust fund, which is to be used in times of emergency or to meet the uncertainties of the future, it is invested primarily with the idea of safety of principal. Accordingly, all but \$34,593.91, which is cash, is invested in government securities. Emphasis has been placed upon varying maturities, particularly short-term obligations, in order that cash may be available from time to time in the event it should prove necessary. Much credit is due to our Finance Com-

mittee, of which Mr. Harry E. Ward is Chairman, for the manner in which it has managed the Board's Reserve Fund.

The customary annual audit of the books of THE CONFERENCE BOARD has been made by Ernst & Ernst. Those interested in more details about the business operations of the Board may find them in the auditor's report attached hereto.

America is in the home stretch in its war efforts. Business is seeing that our boys in the Armed Services continue to get the necessary matériel to help bring the war against Japan to a speedy close. However, with the European conflict behind us, business is confronted with very real problems in reconverting the increasing amount of unused facilities to a civilian production basis. A probable national debt of some \$300 billions, the current tax situation, uncertainties as to how long government controls and subsidies will affect private enterprise, the possibilities of enlarged domestic and foreign markets, are some of the matters which give rise to problems that require practical and realistic thinking if our peacetime economy is to be on a sound basis.

THE CONFERENCE BOARD can be helpful in this situation. Its Trustees recognize this opportunity and have initiated various plans to enable the Board to be of particular value in the period ahead, by providing for a program of long-range research and development work, and by strengthening the executive staff with a view to wider dissemination of factual information on matters which affect the future of business.

The welfare of business and that of the public are necessarily interrelated. Business genius, which has helped to make possible our high standards of living, faces unprecedented problems. Its record of achievement has been such as to justify full confidence in its ability to meet them. In these efforts, business will have the wholehearted cooperation of those who appreciate that our economic welfare in the future will depend to a large degree upon the vision and efficiency with which our postwar plans are conceived, developed and executed. As its contribution, THE CONFERENCE BOARD will continue to act as a beacon—casting light upon those facts which may be helpful to business in most effectively serving the public.
