



ANNUAL REPORT

This report of Saskatchewan Government Telephones for the year 1961 is the 15th report as a Crown Corporation and covers the activities of the System in its fifty-third year.

LTHOUGH the drought in 1961 adversely affected the general economic conditions in the province, the demand for the services offered by the Corporation continued at a relatively high level.


The year's operations resulted in a surplus of \$3,253,555. New capital in the amount of \$7,000,000 was obtained to finance the construction program during 1961. Total assets at the year end amounted to \$107,458,457.

Satisfactory progress was made on the program of converting manual offices to dial operation,

The planning stage was completed and preliminary steps were taken to enable the introduction of Customer Distance Dialling to a large group of subscribers in the near future.

More detailed comments on the year's operations follow.





With a control base at Meadow Lake long distance service by radio is made available to six communities in northwestern Saskatchewan.

Local Telephone Service

There was a net increase of 9,819 installed telephones during the year. This brings the total number of system-owned telephones at the end of 1961 to 193,120 compared with 183,301 at the end of the previous year. Coloured telephones in service increased by 6,304, to a total of 29,302.

During the year the manual offices at Meadow Lake and Outlook were converted to dial-operated toll centres. Unattended community dial offices were established at Wilkie, Unity and Maple Creek replacing the former manual facilities at these points. Local dial telephone service was introduced to the northern community of Buffalo Narrows. Approximately 80.9% of the telephones in service at the year end were dial-operated.

Twenty-four hour a day service was extended to the following seven communities during the year: Canwood, Colonsay, Fox Valley, Kenaston, Meota, Pangman, Regina Beach and Tompkins. Approximately 97% of the Corporation's subscribers now receive continuous telephone service.

The telephone numbers at Melfort, Rosetown, Prince Albert and in the Nutana section of Saskatoon were changed from the two-letter, five number designation to the recently adopted 7 digit numbering. These changes are being made coincident with the issuance of new directories and it is expected that the changeover of all dial offices in the province will be completed in 1963.



Rural Company Telephones

During the year the Corporation provided local and long distance switching facilities for 878 rural telephone companies. At December 31, 1961 there were 51,268 rural company telephones connected to Saskatchewan Government Telephones' offices, 84.1% of which are receiving continuous service.

In addition there are 66 rural and 3 independent companies with approximately 6,538 subscribers who provide their own local switching service.

Long Distance Service

A total of 9,978,945 originating long distance calls were handled during the year. This is a decrease of 2.58% from the previous year's volume and reflects the relatively low level of agricultural production in 1961. However, improved traffic volumes of the last few months of the year indicated that the downward trend may have been reversed.

Long distance service was introduced to the communities of Barthel, Blue Bell, Golden Ridge, Green Lake, Horse Head and Loon River by means of a radio link to a base station at Meadow Lake.



Operator instruction has high priority in the Corporation's training programs to maintain fast, efficient long distance service. Here a trainee handles her "first call", with an experienced operator working by her side and backed up by her supervisor.







The long distance facilities in the province were further extended and improved during the year. The offices at Kindersley, Meadow Lake, North Battleford and Outlook were added to the continental dial network. As a result the majority of the key toll centres in the province are now equipped for operator distance dialling. This is a prerequisite to the introduction of customer distance dialling.

Programming for the introduction of Customer Distance Dialling neared completion at the year end. This service will enable telephone subscribers to dial their own long distance calls with little or no assistance from the operator. Resulting operating economies are substantial and will permit the Corporation to handle an increasing volume of long distance traffic at a reasonable cost.

New and Expanded Services

The latest addition to the services being provided by the Corporation is Direct Wire Television. This was provided for the first time by Saskatchewan Government Telephones at the national convention of the Canadian Public Health Association at Regina in June. The proceedings in the main meeting were relayed by television to overflow audiences accommodated elsewhere in the hotel. This service has many possibilities for use in security procedures, in medical training and hospital administration, in education, in transportation, in merchandising and in industry.



Saskatchewan Government Telephones also introduced a School-to-Home communication service during the year. This service is designed to permit a child to keep pace with classroom studies while temporarily incapacitated at home or in hospital. The special installation provides two-way communication facilities enabling the absent student to listen to and participate in classroom discussions and lectures.

A radio base station was established at Midale to extend the General Mobile Telephone Service in the Estevan-Weyburn area.

In response to customer demands compact telephones with lighted dials were made available in a wide range of colours.

Financial Results

The financial results of the operations of Saskatchewan Government Telephones during 1961 are reflected in the financial statements included in this report.

The Statement of Income shows a Net Income for the year of \$3,253,555 compared with \$1,955,640 for 1960. Total Operating Revenues amounted to \$22,403,716 compared with \$20,259,164 for the previous year. The increase is due in part to the revised rate schedule introduced in late 1960 as well as to an increase in the number of local telephones in use.

Operating expenses amounted to \$16,092,793 compared with \$15,591,717 for the previous year. This is a percentage increase of

3.2% accounted for mainly by increased depreciation charges resulting from a larger investment in telephone property. However, increased wages and an increase in the amount of commissions paid to agents also contributed to the higher operating expenses.

Fixed charges of \$3,769,172 show an increase of \$249,827 over the previous year's amount. The major portion of this increase is due to interest charges on the additional capital required to finance the construction program.

Grants in lieu of taxes paid to municipalities during the year amounted to \$251,166, an increase of \$17,603 over the previous year.

Construction Program

The current expansion and modernization phase of the Corporation requires a continuing high level of capital investment. In 1961 total capital expenditures amounted to \$9,843,260, which, after taking into account plant removed from service, resulted in a net increase in telephone property of \$5,842,390 for the year.

Major projects completed during the year included the dial conversions mentioned earlier in this report as well as extensions to central office facilities at Humboldt, Kindersley, Melfort, North Battleford, Outlook, Swift Current and Yorkton. Larger switch-boards were installed in twenty-three exchanges and extensions to existing switchboards were made at eleven other offices. Telephone facilities at Colonsay, Fox Valley, Kenaston and Pangman were acquired during the year.

In the dial conversion program, work was undertaken toward the conversion of 19 offices to automatic operation. This 1961 segment of the program saw the completion of brick and block buildings at Esterhazy, Fort Qu'Appelle, Gull Lake, Perdue, Regina Beach, Rosthern, Rouleau and Shellbrook. Steel buildings were completed at Arcola, Bateman, Birch Hills, Hodgeville, Neidpath and Webb. Nearing completion at the year end and continuing as winter works projects were the buildings at Carlyle, Gravelbourg, Herbert, Kinistino, LaFleche, Saltcoats, Star City and Stoughton.

Building extensions are in progress at Indian Head, Moosomin, Prince Albert and Yörkton. Construction of a district garage and workshop was commenced at North Battleford.





Training courses in the Plant Department too, played an important role in S.G.T.'s program to maintain high quality telephone service. These members of the Corporation's district staff are being trained in the theory and operation of long distance facilities.

Employee Relations

The training programs were continued and expanded for the various groups of employees throughout the System.

The Corporation wishes to acknowledge the ability and application of its employees who have contributed to a successful operation during the year.

Harmonious relations existed between the Union, represented by the Communications Workers of America, and the Corporation.

Auditor's Report

Pursuant to the provisions of the Saskatchewan Government Telephones Act, an examination of the accounts and records of the Saskatchewan Government Telephones has been made under my direction for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1961. All the information and explanations required by me have been obtained. The examination included a general review of the accounting procedures and such tests of the accounting records and other supporting evidence as was considered necessary in the circumstances.

Securities held for Rural Telephone Companies in connection with the investment of Special Levy Funds have been verified by examination and are shown in a separate statement.

Provision has been made for depreciation of buildings, plant and equipment in accordance with regulations made by the Lieutenant Governor in Council pursuant to Section 34 of the Saskatchewan Government Telephones Act. Full provision has been made for interest on capital advances.

I report that, in my opinion, the accompanying Balance Sheet and Statement of Income are properly drawn up, in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year, so as to show a true and correct view of the state of the financial affairs of the Saskatchewan Government Telephones as at December 31, 1961 and the results of its operations for the year ended on that date, according to the best of my information and the explanations given to me and as shown by the books of account of the Corporation.



