Dear Mr. Vaillancourt:

On August 31, 1945, Colonel Leggatt in his letter to Dr. Wilder Penfield, Director of the Montreal Neurological Institute, indicated that the sum of \$1400 had been authorized for the provision of certain types of lights in our operating room. Two of the lights have now been delivered and I am sending the account for \$640. The other light, on which we are awaiting delivery, is being held up because of shortages of material at the Eastmen Kodak Company. We are quite unable to say when it will be delivered. But if you approve, we would like the balance of the \$1400, that is, \$760 to be set aside for those lights when they are furnished to us.

The lights which we have received are excellent in every detail and are quite indispensable to the satisfactory functioning of our operating room. Again, accept our most sincere thanks for your kindness to the Institute.
