No arrangements have been made out here as yet in regard to concentration of peripheral nerve injuries. I have had several letters from Colonel Macfarlane in regard to it. No doubt something will be done eventually. Many thanks for having the patella hammer sent to me; I have no doubt it will arrive, and when it does I shall be delighted to have it. Things seem to have been slow as far as the Canadians are concerned, but I have no doubt that you will suddenly be frightfully busy.
