Dear Mr. Phillips,

I am enclosing two pictures of nerve cells of different types which are quite accurate and might well be used in some decorative design. One comes from the cerebellum and the other from the spinal cord.

I would like also to refer you to <sup>about by</sup> Camillo Golgi who is one of the neurologists to be honoured in the entrance hall. The name of the book is "Untersuchungen über den feineren bau des central und peripherischen Nervensystems," Gustav Fischer, Jena, 1894. Do get this atlas out of the Academy of Medicine; I am sure Dr. Archibald Malloch will let you have it. You will find on Tafel 4, Figures 1 to 5 and 1a to 3a, drawings of nerve fibers which you might well use for some type of linear design. These are nerve fibers or nerve tubes and can be made to curve any way desired. Figures 2, 3, 4, and 5 are the most typical. I would recommend also Tafel 7, 8, 11, 24, 25 and 26 as being decorative and accurate, although any of the drawings in this book might well be used.

I am enclosing also a list of the names of the neurologists who are to be ~~placed~~ in the entrance hall. I have pictures of most of these men so that plaques could be made if we decide to use them. The names should be arranged according to countries, which you will see indicated on the list. If there is any special honour to be given any one according to position it should go to Hughlings Jackson, but I should advise uniform treatment for the names. I have not been able to find so far my detailed measurements of the base of the statue; no doubt you have been able to get a close estimate from the information we have given you already.
