Dear Doctor Weisenburg:

I have seen your letter of November 15 and the reply which Doctor O'Brien sent you under date of November 18. In starting the publications under the title of Methods and Problems of Medical Education, Doctor Pearce was largely influenced by the fact that most of the general and special medical journals did not devote much space to articles discussing the methods and problems of medical education.

The series of publications which we have issued has been discontinued for the time being, partly because of the need of retrenchment of certain activities on our part and partly because we felt that in many fields of medical education we could sensibly discontinue the series until a satisfactory number of new developments had occurred which would deserve description.

It would interest me to know how large a circulation the Archives of Neurology and Psychiatry has at the present time and to how many individuals or institutions you would suggest that a separate collection of the papers to which you refer could usefully be sent. I had assumed that the Archives has a rather wide circulation. Could you give me some additional information along these lines?
