have them published in the Archives in series under the
heading of Lives of Outstanding Neurologists or something
of that sort. The whole list might be published with
the exception of Sherrington and Cushing, to whom it
might perhaps be embarrassing. The list which we have
in mind is as follows:

Jackson, Horsley and Sherrington from
England; Charcot and Claude Bernard from France; von
Monakow, Switzerland; Hitzig and Alzheimer, Germany;
Pavlov, Russia; Cajal, Spain; Golgi, Italy; Weir Mitchell
and Cushing, United States.

They will be entitled Leaders in the
Field of Neurology or something of that sort. If you
want to do this I should expect to take reprints from
the publications to bind into our dedication volume
and I should like to have them all appear before next
October or at least to go through the press before that
time.
