Dear Paul,

Thank you very much for your advice concerning the formation of a trust. As a result of your letter, I think we shall incorporate in Canada and I shall write to any donors there may be, that they ^{are} deductible as far as income tax is concerned. Thank you very much.

It hardly seems possible that we actually saw you and Mae up here in Canada and at Memphramagog. Slater Lewis, whom you met, ~~has~~ asked me before he went back to Montreal whether we would be willing to sell a portion of the farm on which he has been living. I told him of my conversation with you and that in any case I should not be willing to cut a small piece off the land, but that we would sell the land between the road and the lakeside, exclusive of the lakeside cottage, but including the farm house in which he has been living.
