THE PRESIDENT            WASHINGTON.

AS CITIZENS OF THE UNITED STATES TRAVELLING WITH ITS PASSPORTS AND SURVIVORS OF THE SUSSEX OUTRAGE AND HAVING SEEN AT FIRST HAND THE HORRORS AND NEEDLESS LOSS OF LIFE OF INNOCENT WOMEN AND CHILDREN AS A RESULT OF THE DESTRUCTION WITHOUT WARNING OF UNARMED PASSENGER VESSELS AND HAVING IN MIND THE WARNING TO GERMANY CONTAINED IN YOUR VARIOUS COMMUNICATIONS AND YOUR NOTIFICATION THAT SHE WOULD BE HELD TO STRICT ACCOUNTABILITY FOR HER ACTS WE SOLEMNLY PROTEST IN THE NAME OF HUMANITY AND DECENCY AGAINST FURTHER FUTILE WARNINGS AND RESPECTFULLY CALL ON YOU TO SO ACT AS TO PREVENT THE FURTHER REPETITION OF SUCH PIRACY OR TO CEASE THE HOLLOW PRETENCE OF FRIENDSHIP FOR A NATION WILLING TO RESORT TO SUCH METHODS.
