My dear Penfield,

I am in receipt of your letter of the 24th inst. and have notified the Bursar of the University to send you a draft for \$1,000.00 within the next few days. This will be charged up to one of our research funds, and for which you do not need to give an itemized account.

I am delighted to hear that Dr. Cone is coming, and I hope that we can arrange everything to his satisfaction and yours.

Would you be good enough to append to the itemized list of equipment desired any details with regard to the kind of instrument, where purchased, etc. Could you also specify any details as to alterations in the rooms, in order that we might prepare against your coming during the summer months?

We will arrange for Dr. Cone's arrival, and fix the question of his appointment in the University and the Hospitals as soon as it is possible.

It will be unnecessary to do anything more about licences for practising. This cannot possibly come up prior to September, when the Annual Meeting of the College of Physicians & Surgeons takes place for the consideration of such licences. You might, however, write to Dr. Joseph Gauvreau, Secretary of the College of Physicians & Surgeons of the Province of Quebec, 364, St. Catherine Street East, Montreal, explaining to him that you have been appointed as Clinical Professor of Neurological Surgery at McGill, and that you would like to send whatever applications are necessary for obtaining your licence. He should then reply, giving the necessary information. You might send me copies of this correspondence, so that when I return, I shall be

able to forward your interests in every way necessary. In making this application, you should give Dr. Gauvreau a little statement of your previous education, degrees, etc., and possibly that might suffice. At all events, I see no reason for anxiety about your licence.

Archibald is back, looking very well. He will write you with reference to offices, and now that Cone is coming too, perhaps some different arrangements might occur to him, as also to you.

If this communication leaves you in any doubt about anything, write me at once, inasmuch as I am leaving Thursday morning early for New Orleans.
