I cannot tell you how much I appreciate your willingness to free those rooms for work in Neurobiology and Neuro-pathology. We have had a very close association with medicine here at the Presbyterian Hospital, and I am looking forward to the laboratory appointment up there with a great deal of pleasure. I hope you did not promise them before you had considered what the loss would mean to you in space. To be perfectly frank, I doubt very much whether I should have decided to come to Montreal had you not made that offer.

You asked me to send you the account of my traveling expenses, and I do so only on the understanding that you have some funds to draw from for such a purpose. The railroad fare and pullman berths came to \$34.00.

They are trying to induce Dr. Cone to stay here at the Presbyterian Hospital. I had hoped that he would come with me as he would be of the greatest help, both in the laboratory and in the operative clinic. I should like to bring Dr. Cone up there if possible before very long so that he may see Montreal, and catch some of the enthusiasm which I have, for the the undertaking up there.

Also I have so far had little opportunity to talk with any one at the Montreal General Hospital, and am anxious to get a clearer idea of what my relationship would be, or, should be to that Hospital. I should like to talk to you about this if I come up again.

Mrs. Penfield and I are looking forward to the move with both pleasure and trepidation.
